# | Role & Importance of Players, Officials, Spectators and VVIPs





Players, officials, Spectators and VVIPs play a crucial role in any sporting event.



**Spectators** rush to the stadium to see their favourite **players**. They want to enjoy a **great moment** watching them on the pitch.



**Officials** (referees and other CAF representatives etc.) are a critical part of the match. It cannot take place without them.



The participation of **VVIPs** (government members, sponsors, etc.) is important because they are often facilitating, supporting, and financing several different activities related to matches / football activities.

- Failure to plan for a proportionate response to the risks at each match
- As a result disproportionate response to issues and incidents
- Overzealous policing outside and inside of the stadium
- Disruption to orderly ingress and egress because of arbitrary closures
- Lack of integrated planning results in chaos on the pitch and in the tribunes
- Exceeding of maximum safe capacity and having to use pitch areas as overspill for spectators to prevent a disaster in the tribunes
- Poor risk assessment

# Background – Recurring issues (Players & Officials)







- Failure to secure pitch and control access intentional pitch incursions (one or a few people) and pitch invasions (many people)
- Lack of effective access control to the competition area breaches by people with malicious intent
- Too many people gaining access to the competition area and pitch who do not have a working role (including public in some cases)
- Attacks on players and officials or their vehicles / dressing rooms
- Various injuries to people caught up in the chaos
- Reputational issues to all parties concerned

# Background – Recurring issues (VVIPs)





- Failure to inspect VVIP facilities before the day of the match
- Failure to agree a plan together with the relevant governmental authorities and VVIP representatives
- Failure to stick to the agreed plan
- No accreditation / poor implementation of accreditation in place
- **Distraction of security forces** including security officers due to VVIP presence and failure to police all of the stadium as a result
- No control on entourage of the VVIPs
- Too many people in the VVIP area with no obvious means to identify who is who (e.g. no access devices)
- Overzealous policing and arbitrary closures of areas, routes etc.

#### New type of threat:





- Sport event organisers over the years have come up with ways to manage the known and conventional threats to sport events
- We must now take into account the emerging threat to sport events It should be part of our safety planning from now.

Protecting players, officials, Supporters and VVIPs has a big impact on the match / event itself.

The positive outcomes of protecting players, officials, supporters and VVIPs for the event are:


- Smooth match operations
- Safety and security of everyone involved
- Tranquillity of the match
- Setting a good example for supporters
- Respect
- Label of quality



#### | The Impacts (cont'd)

However, we must keep in mind that any failure on protecting those particular people can result in:

- Match cancellation / abandonment
- Disorder in the stadium
- Injury / Death
- Host country / club / team reputational damage
- Financial loss
- Negative economic impact
- Political issues
- CAF / FIFA disciplinary action





# **Key recommendations**



The use of **UAS** must be guided by certain international conventions and national regulations

Production companies of these devices must also sign to these regulatory conventions

The point is that efforts should be geared towards ensuring that the manufacturing and sales of these machines is well managed

National governments should set licensing criteria for its use within their territories

These criteria's must always be guided by the possible havoc that can be done with this equipment should it get to the wrong hands
