LEADERSHIP, COORDINATION, COHERENCE

KEY HIGH-LEVEL EVENTS

→ The 21st GCTF Coordinating Committee Meeting, co-hosted by Egypt and EU in Cairo, focused on strategic priorities and future action to counter global terrorism threats (4 May)



→ UNODC organized a <u>high-level event</u> in Baghdad for the "Victims' Voices, Silencing Terrorism" <u>campaign</u>, which concluded the UNODC-AVT-L <u>project</u> for Iraq on supporting victims of terrorism (13 June)



- → The <u>Third UN High-Level Conference</u> on Counter-Terrorism under the <u>theme</u> "Addressing Terrorism through Reinvigorated Multilateralism and Institutional Cooperation" (19-20 June); <u>40 side events</u> co-organized by over 95 stakeholders (#CTWeek, 19-23 June)
- Morocco and OSAPG held a high-level event to commemorate the <u>2nd</u> <u>International Day for Countering Hate</u> <u>Speech</u> (19 June)
- UNOCT and the State of Qatar held their <u>Fifth High-Level Strategic Dialogue</u> (19 June)

KEY ISSUES RAISED BY HEADS OF ENTITIES

- → CTED ASG Gherman noted that the CT Compact Platform has provided access to critical data in CTED assessments that better inform planning and implementation of technical assistance (31 May)
- SG Guterres <u>stressed</u> that through the CT Compact, the UN is providing practical, coordinated support to Member States, helping countries implement the Global Counter-Terrorism Strategy (19 June)
- → USG Voronkov <u>underscored</u> that "the magnitude, complexities and evolving nature of terrorism require a robust and coordinated regional and international response" (19 June)

UNODC ED Waly <u>highlighted</u> that human rights must be front and center in our responses. This means due process, fair trials, humane prisons, respecting fundamental freedoms, and rehabilitating and reintegrating offenders into society (20 June)



- → ICAO SG Salazar <u>called</u> on aviation security authorities and CT agencies to work together to put in place effective and sustainable security measures to safeguard aviation against terrorist attacks (23 June)
- → UNICRI Director De Meo stressed that "youth involvement in shaping policies for the present and future is not merely symbolic, but rather necessary for sustainable and effective solutions across peace and development contexts" (23 June)
- → UN Women Director Hendriks emphasized that women are still not meaningfully involved in all stages of decision-making, or significantly included and represented in security institutions (26 June)

- ENGAGEMENT WITH MEMBER STATES
- → UN Women-CTED-Canada-Tunisia held an event on "Strengthening Inclusive Processes of the UN GCTS Review: Voices of Women-led Civil Society Organizations Discussion with Member States" (5 May)
- → UNODC held training workshops in the <u>Dominican Republic</u>, Portugal, <u>West and</u> <u>Central Africa</u>, Mozambique on firearms trafficking and disarmament (May-June)
- → OSAPG <u>official visit to Brazil</u> to assess the risk of genocide/atrocity crimes against indigenous peoples, Brazilians of African descent & other groups at risk (1-12 May)

→ CTED-Team of Experts on the Rule of Law and Sexual Violence in Conflict convened an Expert Group Meeting on SGBV acts in terrorist contexts (10-11 May)



→ CTED conducted visits to <u>Republic of</u> <u>Korea</u> (22-25 May) and <u>Chile</u> (6-9 June) and <u>extensive consultations</u> on nonbinding guiding principles on new technologies → UNOCT and <u>Spanish Memorial Center</u> for the Victims of Terrorism opened a <u>Memories Exhibit</u> in Vitoria (7 June)




- UNOCT <u>Expert Group Meeting</u> in Rabat, Morocco, addressed Countering the Threat of Kidnap for Ransom (8 June)

- Security Council <u>Arria-formula meeting</u> on "Enhancing the capacities of Member States to ensure a gender-responsive approach to counter-terrorism" (26 June)

UNOCT-CTED-UNODC <u>examined</u> the successes and challenges faced by the <u>Lake Chad</u> <u>Basin</u> region in SPRR of persons associated with terrorist groups (#CTWeek, 21 June)



RMME WG, Qatar, Morocco, Nigeria, Tunisia <u>launched</u> the <u>UN Joint Appeal for</u> <u>Counter-Terrorism in Africa</u>, which features ten multi-partner initiatives that will be jointly delivered by 16 entities (#CTWeek, 22 June)

CTED-UNESCO-Italy <u>discussed</u> the <u>linkages</u> between destruction/illicit trade of cultural property and terrorism (#CTWeek, 22 June)

UNOCT-UNODC three-day <u>"Snow Leopard"</u> tabletop exercise/workshop on legal frameworks & nuclear forensics for Central Asia and the Caucasus region (30 May-1 June)

UNOCT and the OSCE Centre in Ashgabat held a <u>regional</u> workshop on the prevention of bioterrorism attacks involving biological agents and toxins (5-6 June)

GCTF <u>Sixth Workshop</u> on Funding and Enabling Community-level P/CVE (1 June); real-life simulations at <u>recent tabletop</u> <u>exercises</u> on the use of GCTF REMVE Toolkit (8 June) UNOCT-CTED-SR HR&CT participated in launch of GCCS' <u>Blue Sky VI Report</u>, sponsored by the Netherlands, Norway, Switzerland (31 May)
