### Leadership



USG Voronkov briefed the Security Council on the 18th report of the Secretary-General on the threat posed by ISIL (Da'esh). He warned that

"Da'esh continues to pose a serious threat to international peace and security, notably in conflict zones, despite significant progress achieved by Member States in countering the threat." (15 Feb)

To mark the International Day for the **Prevention of Violent Extremism as** and when Conducive to Terrorism (PVE Day) on 12 February, USG Voronkov called for coordinated, inclusive, transparent as well as human rights-based and gender-responsive policies and programming to address this rapidly evolving threat at an event organized by the Permanent Mission of Iraq as well as in a video message. The Office provides its capacity-building support to Member States through the UN Counter-Terrorism Centre (UNCCT) and the Special Projects and Innovation Branch (SPIB). UNCCT was established by an initial contribution of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to the Counter-Terrorism Trust Fund in 2011. UNCCT has an Advisory Board composed of 21 Member States plus the European Union (EU) as a Guest Member. SPIB was established following a contribution by the State of Qatar as part of the Contribution Agreement between UNOCT and the State of Qatar signed in 2018.

To enhance coordination and coherence, the UN Global Counter-Terrorism Coordination Compact, which is a coordination framework bringing together 46 entities, was launched by the UN Secretary-General in December 2018. The Compact operates thanks to a contribution of the State of Qatar. It operates through its Coordination Committee and eight thematic Inter-Agency Working Groups, which were revitalized in April 2019, providing an "All-of-UN approach" to the system's work on counter-terrorism and preventing and countering violent extremism as conducive to terrorism.



#### **UNOCT Mandate**

Established through GA resolution 71/291 on 15 June 2017, the Office has five functions:

- **Provide leadership** on the GA counter-terrorism mandates entrusted to the Secretary-General from across the UN system
- **Enhance coordination and coherence** across the 46 Global Counter-Terrorism Compact entities to ensure the balanced implementation of the four pillars of the UN Global CT Strategy
- Strengthen delivery of UN counter-terrorism capacity building assistance to Member States
- Improve visibility, advocacy and resource mobilization for UN counter-terrorism efforts
- Ensure that due priority is given to counterterrorism across the UN system and that the important work on preventing violent extremism is firmly rooted in the Strategy

#### **Recent Pledges to UNOCT**

During the month of February, UNOCT received contributions in support of the following programmes:

**Italy: USD 163,339** earmarked funding for the UNOCT Programme Office for Counter-Terrorism and Training in Africa, located in Rabat, Morocco.

**Qatar: USD 1,667,000** earmarked funding for the UNOCT International Hub on Behavioral Insights to Counter Terrorism, located in Doha, Qatar.

### Capacity-building

### **UN Counter-Terrorism Centre (UNCCT)**

The Global Weapons Programme and the U.S. Department of State held a virtual seminar for Central Asian Member States on the development of CBRNE exercise. (7 Feb)

Together with the Co-Chairs of the GCTF Foreign Terrorist Fighters Working Group, the U.S. and Jordan, UNCCT organized a workshop to kick off the development of the Addendum to the 2016 GCTF Good Practices in the Area of Border Security and Management (BSM). (22 Feb)

As part of a joint project on preventing and combatting the illicit trafficking



of small arms and light weapons (SALW), UNCCT and UNODC's Global Firearms Programme held a training in Ashgabat, Turkmenistan, on operational measures to address the terrorism-arms-crime nexus. (22 Feb)

### **Special Projects & Innovation Branch (SPIB)**

The UN Countering Terrorist Travel (CT Travel) Programme held a 4-day training for Kyrgyz officials in Bishkek (5-8 Feb) and trained 30 aviation personnel in Ashgabat on using API and PNR data to detect and counter terrorist travel and prevent human and drug trafficking. (19-20 Feb)

The Global Fusion Cells Programme, with Morocco, delivered a threat assessment course in Rabat to analysts from The Gambia, Senegal, Liberia, Libya, Mauritania, Nigeria and Sierra Leone. (8-13 Feb)

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The Global Programme to Counter Terrorist Threats Against Vulnerable

**Targets** and **Australia** organized an <u>expert briefing</u> on Australia's experience in protecting crowded places from terrorism. (13 Feb)

On the International PVE Day, the **Global Sports Programme** <u>launched</u> an e-learning course on the "Prevention of Violent Extremism through Sports," available on <u>Connect & Learn</u>. (14 Feb)

#### **EU-UN Facility**


The EU-UN Global Terrorism Threats Facility completed a second mentoring mission to support Uganda in strengthening national coordination and capacities for CT investigation and prosecution within a framework based on the rule of law and human rights. (5-13 Feb)



### **Top Contributors to UNOCT**
