






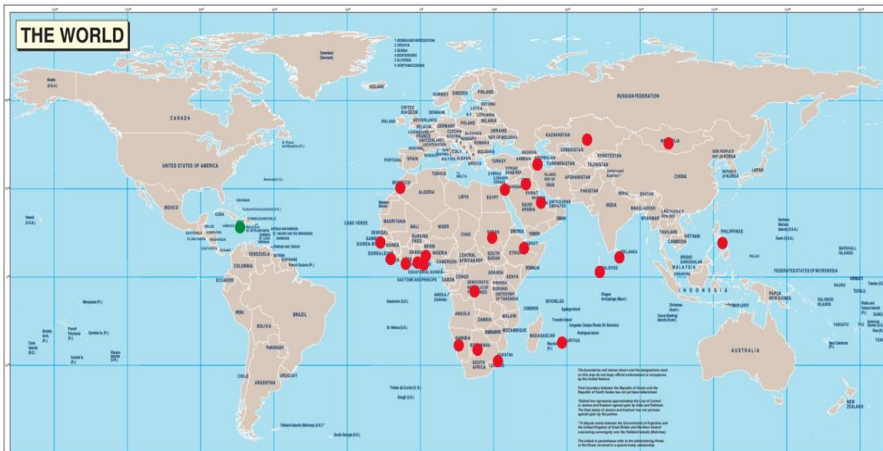

UN Counterterrorist Travel Programme

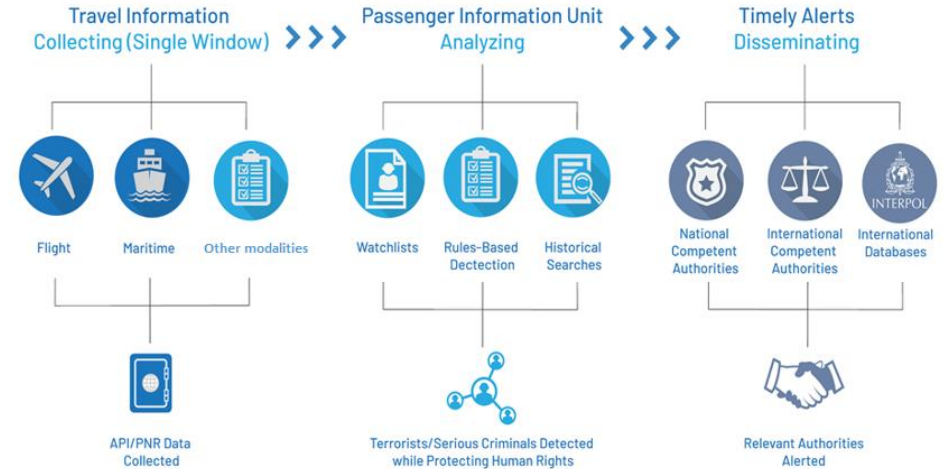


The **Counterterrorist Travel Programme**, a flagship global initiative of the [United Nations Office of Counter-Terrorism \(UNOCT\)](#), assists Member States in building their capabilities to detect and counter terrorists and other serious criminals by using Advance Passenger Information (API) and Passenger Name Record (PNR) to improve the use of international databases, such as INTERPOL databases, with known and suspected terrorists, and enhance international information exchange, in accordance with Security Council resolutions [2178](#) (2014), [2396](#) (2017), and [2482](#) (2019) and relevant human rights principles and privacy laws.

Comprehensive Support Package



The Counterterrorist Travel Programme uses four pillars to build or enhance the detection capacity, otherwise known as Passenger Information Units (PIUs), flexibly applied depending on the state of readiness priorities of beneficiary Member States. This follows an assessment of the beneficiary Member State's current needs and joint development of a roadmap for implementation with national stakeholders through:

- Assistance toward establishing a legislative framework and governance structure for the new PIU.



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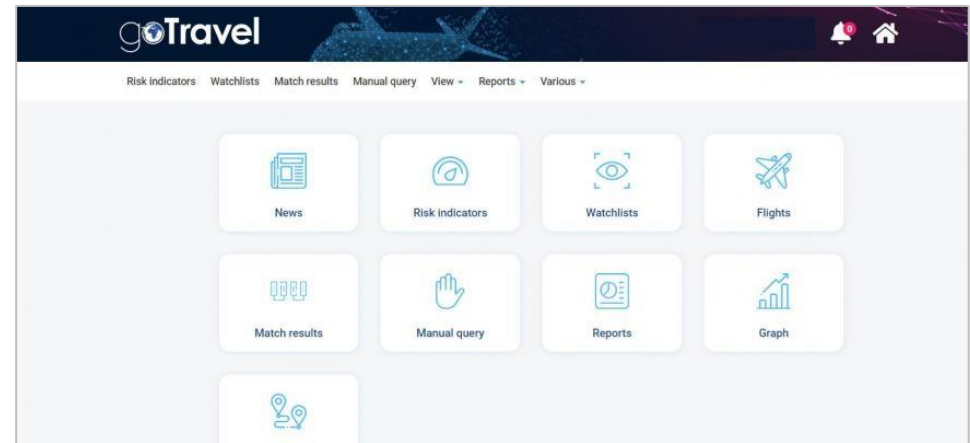
- Institutional set-up of a PIU and building operational capabilities and expertise to stem the flow of Foreign Terrorist Fighters (FTFs) and serious criminals.
- Facilitating air carrier engagement and connectivity, thanks to close cooperation with the transport industry.
- Deployment of the goTravel software system to help Member States sieve through passenger data effectively and efficiently to detect threats.

All-of-UN Approach

In an All-of-UN partnership with the [United Nations Counter-Terrorism Executive Directorate \(CTED\)](#), the [United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime \(UNODC – AIRCOP/TPB\)](#), the [International Civil Aviation Organization \(ICAO\)](#), the [United Nations Office of Information and Communication Technology \(OICT\)](#), and [INTERPOL](#), the Programme comprehensively assists Member States in legislative, operational, carrier engagement, and technical areas. This includes the donation and deployment of the goTravel software system. The Programme has been designed in accordance with human rights principles and United Nations policies in this regard.



The collection, sharing, analysis, and dissemination of data by the PIUs is empowered by the goTravel software system. This technology is part of the



comprehensive support package to Member States and includes training, sharing of good practices, and expert advice. The goTravel software is a reconfigured version of the Travel Information Portal (TRIP) system donated by the Kingdom of the Netherlands.

Each beneficiary Member State also has secured access to the [Cooperative Online Platform \(COP\)](#), which allows real-time interactive collaborations and information exchange for smooth project implementation.
