	<p>Pascale Allotey is a leader in gender, equity, health and human rights. Her recent work includes challenging the boundaries of global health, advocating for accountability in the decolonization of global health and international development, and expanding opportunities to diversify the voices of contributors to global debates and decision making – particularly in evidence generation, policy and programme implementation within the UN system, with governments, NGOs and the academic community. Dr Allotey is a triple-certified nurse, midwife and public health nurse with a multidisciplinary background in clinical health sciences, implementation research, anthropology, and epidemiology. She holds a PhD in Public Health and a MMedSci in Community Health from the University of Western Australia, and a BA in Nursing and Psychology from the University of Ghana, Legon. Dr. Allotey has published extensively including on: sexual and reproductive health; harmful traditional practices; gender, sex and disease; migrants and refugees; health systems research; implementation research, and community engagement. In 2022, she was appointed Director of the Department of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Research at the World Health Organization (WHO). Prior to joining WHO, Dr. Allotey was Director of the United Nations University International Institute for Global Health (UNU-IIGH) in Kuala Lumpur Malaysia.</p>
	<p>Alessio Cangiano is currently the Chief a.i. of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)'s Population and Development Branch, Programme Division. He is a demographer (PhD Sapienza 2005) with extensive experience in population data collection, demographic research and policy analysis, technical assistance and statistical capacity building in Europe, Africa and the Asia-Pacific region. He came to UNFPA's Headquarter from UNFPA Mozambique Country Office, where he provided technical assistance to the National Statistical Office on census analysis and dissemination and to the Ministry of Economy and Finance on population and development issues. In his previous roles, Alessio worked as coordinator of the Demography and Official Statistics program at the regional University of the South Pacific; as a researcher at the University of Oxford's Center on Migration, Policy and Society; and as a statistical and research consultant for various international organizations.</p>
	<p>Cheryl Sawyer is Chief of the Population Trends and Analysis Branch in the Population Division of the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs. She oversees the teams preparing the World Population Prospects and World Urbanization Prospects as well as analytical reports on the relationships between population dynamics and sustainable development. She also leads substantive support to the Commission on Population and Development. Prior to this role, she led the Division's programme planning and management team in the Office of the Director. Over her career at the United Nations, she has worked on population estimates and projections, mortality analysis, and international migration and has led or contributed to numerous reports of the Secretary-General and technical publications on population issues. Prior to joining the United Nations, Ms. Sawyer worked in the International Programs Center of the United States Census Bureau. She holds a master's degree in applied demography from Georgetown University.</p>
