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Access to health products is a universal need



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Health for all, at all ages

- Universal health coverage (UHC) means that all people have access to the full range of quality health services they need, when and where they need them, without financial hardship.
- Achieving UHC is a target (3.8) of the 2030 Sustainable
 Development Goals 3 "Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages" and aligns with the ICPD Programme of Action by promoting equitable access to essential health services.
- Improving access to safe, effective, quality-assured and affordable medicines, medical devices, assistive technologies and other health products for all is crucial to achieve UHC.






An off-track world requiring urgent action

- The world is off track to achieve UHC goals by 2030
- 4.5 billion people are not fully covered by essential health services¹
- 2 billion people face **financial hardship** due to out-of-pocket health spending²
- The cost of medicines and other health products is often the main drivers of impoverishing out-of-pocket spending³




Health product and technology ecosystem

Two interlinked programme objectives in the Road Map





Advancing access in a changing world

 Population growth, shifting age structures, rapid urbanization, migration... These demographic and economic changes are further intensified the urgent threat of climate change and pose new challenges on road to improve access.

• Limited access to health products remains a significant barrier to the efforts for overcoming the rise of antimicrobial resistance and noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) and the growing mental health burden.



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The way forward (1)

- The ICPD Programme of Action and the UHC agenda are complementary agendas for ensuring healthy lives and promoting well-being for all at all ages and achieving the SDGs.
- Investing in universal health coverage and in access to health products not only promotes equity and social cohesion but also benefits development and economy.





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The way forward (2)

Strong political will, multisectoral cooperation and coordination, sustainable financing, and a people-centered and life-course approach are required to leave no one behind and improving access to health products by:

- Strengthening pricing policies, financial protection and increasing the use of qualityassured generics and biosimilars
- Improving procurement and supply chains including through geographically diversified manufacturing
- Strengthening regulatory systems, enhancing harmonization and regulatory convergence
- Aligning intellectual property policies with global health needs and promoting best practices
