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# Programme of Action - adopted at the ICPD, Cairo, 1994

C. Elderly people

Objectives: (c) To develop a social support system, both formal and informal, with a view to enhancing the ability of families to take care of elderly people within the family.

Actions: **6.18** ..... Governments should develop social security systems that ensure greater intergenerational and intragenerational equity and solidarity and that provide support to elderly people through the encouragement of multigenerational families, and the **provision of long-term support and services** for growing numbers of frail older people.

# Focus of Long-Term Care

- Peoples' needs
- Focus on trajectory of functional ability
- Not merely taking over, but stimulating to do as much possible themselves
- Not only focusing on meeting older people's basic needs for survival, but also people's abilities:
  - $\,\circ\,$  to move around,
  - $\circ\,$  to build and maintain relationships,
  - $\,\circ\,$  to learn, grow and decide, and
  - $\circ\,$  to contribute to their communities
- People have the right and deserve the freedom to realize their continuing aspirations to well-being, meaning and dignity, and a good life, even in the event of significant loss in intrinsic capacity.

### **Discriminatory practices during Covid-19 pandemic**

Ageism is widespread, in particular related to older people with significant loss in capacities

Allocation according to chronological age only:

- Scarce resources, such as ventilators or access to intensive care units
- Physical isolation measures
- Strategies for lifting lockdown measures
- 40% of deaths related to COVID-19 linked to LTC facilities,
- in some HIC 80% in these facilities

# Elder abuse and Use of restraints

#### **Elder abuse**

- In home settings and long-term care facilities
- Different types: verbal, physical, sexual, neglect

#### **Use of restraints**

- In home settings and long-term care facilities
- Physical and pharmacological
- Examples of physical restraints: bed rails, belts, fixed tables on a chair or chairs preventing getting up, containment sheets and pajamas
- Towards restraint-free environment



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# Misconceptions

- ✓ Families are the backbone of care
- Unpaid care does not entail any cost for society
- ✓ To care for older people with a significant loss in capacity doesn't need training
- ✓ There is nothing between unpaid care and institutional care
