- Reach: 187 National Societies
- Experience: long history of providing assistance to migrants
- Humanitarian focus: work is guided by the seven
 Fundamental Principles



Migration & the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies



IFRC objective: based on the principles of humanity and impartiality and in consultation with public authorities, providing humanitarian assistance to vulnerable migrants irrespective of their legal status.

Migration activities:

- Humanitarian assistance
- Protection
- Humanitarian Diplomacy and Advocacy
- Integration and Reintegration
- Health & Social Services



Framework for IFRC's work on Migration

- The "Together for Humanity" Declaration (2007): 30th International Conference of the RCRC reaffirmed the role of National Societies in providing humanitarian assistance to vulnerable migrants.
- IFRC Policy on Migration (2009): guides National Societies in their direct assistance to migrants and improves the consistency of IFRC's response and cooperation with other actors.



Framework for IFRC's work on Migration

"Migration: Ensuring Access, Dignity, Respect for Diversity and Social Inclusion" Resolution (2011): 31st International Conference of RCRC confirms the focus of future IFRC migration activities to be:

- 1. Access to all migrants
- Better border procedures
- 3. Fighting xenophobia through social inclusion
- 4. Enhanced global partnerships



Features of IFRC's focus on social inclusion



- Fight against xenophobia: practical actions to promote diversity and nonviolence
- Migrant-centred approach: focus on the needs and aspirations of migrants in all humanitarian programming
- Coordination: National Societies working together to assist migrants along the migratory trail
- Advocacy: using international and regional platforms to promote the importance of social inclusion



Examples of Red Cross Red Crescent National Society initiatives



Don't Judge a Book by its Cover – Armenia: focus on awareness raising to challenge public perceptions about migrants.



Harmony Awards – Australia: competition with projects aiming at promoting tolerance.



First Contact Programme – Canada: information for migrants on housing, employment, legal aid and social assistance.



Examples of Red Cross Red Crescent National Society initiatives



Comic books - Democratic Republic of the Congo & Belgium: using comic books to highlight the realities of migration to Europe



Campaign "Act! Reject discrimination and celebrate diversity" – Ecuador: promotion of a culture of non-violence and respect for diversity



Positive Images Campaign – EU: operates in 14 EU countries and aims to reach 3,000,000 young people between 2009-2012.



Examples of Red Cross Red Crescent National Society initiatives



Yes Project – Finland: focuses on a 4-step programme for better integration and increased employment in rural areas for migrants.



1001 Strengths – Netherlands: facilitates social interaction between elderly Dutch individuals and migrant women to promote intercultural dialogue.



Ubuntu initiative - Southern Africa: focus is on trying to improve social inclusion of vulnerable migrants in their host communities
