








# Population aged 60-79 years and 80 years or over in sub-Saharan Africa, 1990-2050


Percentage of Total Population Aged 60 years or over (2015)


Percentage of Total Population Aged 60 years or over (2050)


## Population ageing implies rising old-age dependency ratio



OADR=Age 65+ / Age 15-64 (per hundred persons)



### The labour force participation of older persons in Africa is the highest in the world








### **Key trends**

- 1. Population ageing is one of the most important demographic trends
- 2. The number of older people is growing faster than any other group.
- 3. Africa will experience the fastest growth rate of the number of older person than any other region in the world.
- 4. The older population is itself ageing
- 5. Population ageing raises concerns about the economic security of older people, health and social care spending, and inter-generational support.

## Key points

•Older people tend to be less poor than total population in most Latin American and developed countries, but poorer than total population in most of Africa countries.

•Old-age pension coverage is adequate in Europe, Northern America and Latin America, but still low in many developing regions, particularly in the Middle East (30%) and Africa (22%).

• Older men and women in sub-Saharan Africa are making other vital contributions to their families and communities.

• Many older persons whose adult children have migrated in search of work, or who have died as a result of HIV/AIDS, are the main care-providers for their children
