Remarks by Mr. Movses Abelian, Under-Secretary-General for General Assembly and Conference Management and UN Coordinator for Multilingualism

Multilingualism is a core value of the United Nations and the Chinese language, as one of its six official languages, is a crucial part of our efforts to promote understanding and cooperation among nations.

Let us celebrate, on this day, and every day, the richness and beauty of the Chinese language.
