# Involvement of the Non-Self-Governing Territories of the Caribbean in the activities of the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean

Reporting period: 2022-2023

Madam Chair,

On behalf of Mr. José Manuel Salazar-Xirinachs, the Executive Secretary of our regional commission, I thank the Committee for once again inviting the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) to participate in this year's Regional Seminar.

This year, ECLAC celebrates 75 years of contributing to the theory and practice of economic and social development in Latin America and the Caribbean. Over the years, our development focus has moved from the importance of industrialization to productive transformation with social equity, and within the last decade to the importance of equality. It is within that context that we situate our support for the Non-Self-Governing Territories of the Caribbean<sup>1</sup>.

The continuing longer-term impacts of COVID-19 on the global economy, the global implications of the invasion of Ukraine, and the ongoing impacts of climate change combined to create new and significant challenges for the Territories in the past year.

With your permission, I will briefly elaborate on some challenges and share some information on the ways in which ECLAC has engaged with the Territories since the Regional Seminar in 2022. A table noting which Territories were engaged in ECLAC activities is annexed to this statement.



Average case fatality rate as of 19 May 2023. Source: WHO The impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic varied significantly across the Caribbean, and across the Territories. However, the reported case fatality rates for all the Territories have remained lower than the means for the world, Latin America, and that of the Caribbean, at less than 0.5 per cent.


Indicative of an improved situation, all COVID-19-related entry restrictions for travel have been lifted across the Territories. This is important, because as noted at previous seminars, the impact of COVID-19 on the economies of the Territories was significant, with the economies most dependent on tourism suffering the most.




COVID-19 statistics for the NSGTs as of 19 May 2023 Source: WHO

For the Territories where data on economic growth is available, all have seen some measure of growth since 2020. Unsurprisingly, it is the countries that recorded the largest losses in 2020 that have also recorded the largest gains since then. For the remaining countries, growth has been modest.


Stayover tourist arrivals have begun to increase for all Territories as restrictions have been reduced and lifted, with some seeing higher-than-average arrivals both in 2021 and 2022. However, as of the middle of 2022, tourist arrivals had not yet fully recovered in most Territories.

Given its continued impacts on the sustainable development of the Territories, the implementation of strategies for resilient recovery from COVID-19 will remain high on the agenda for the region and for ECLAC. For example, as part of our ongoing research and other activities related to socioeconomic issues and sustainable development, most of the Territories were covered in research on the ageing Caribbean and in a policy brief on improving broadband quality and affordability in the Caribbean. The Territories were also active participants in meetings organized by ECLAC, including the Fifteenth Regional Conference on Women.

## Resilience and adaptation

Contrary to expectations, 2022 was, thankfully, a fairly average hurricane season, with 2023 expected to be slightly below average. In 2022, several Territories marked five years since Hurricanes Irma and Maria. While the impacts continue to be felt, significant progress has been made in the rebuilding process across the affected Territories, which to a large extent was informed by the comprehensive Damage and Loss Assessments which ECLAC conducted in Anguilla, British Virgin Islands and the Turks and Caicos Islands, and the attendant recommendations. Thankfully, some funding for resilience and adaptation remains available, such as through the RESEMBID Programme<sup>2</sup>. However, prospects for future funding are uncertain.

The high production of waste, and associated illegal dumping, is a threat to human health and the marine environment across the Territories. Sargassum blooms remain a challenge for several islands. In July last year, a state of emergency was declared in the United States Virgin Islands to mitigate the impact of unusually high amounts of Sargassum seaweed, which also had a negative impact on water production. Additionally, solutions to the problem remain scarce. For example, Territories that have attempted to use the seaweed as fertilizer, have found high levels of heavy metals in vegetables grown in Sargassum-enriched soil.

Deforestation, in particular of mangroves, is another threat to the environment and marine ecosystem in several Territories. The discovery of coral diseases that threaten coral reefs and the surrounding biodiversity in some Territories is also of great concern. Increased temperatures in the Territories have also been linked to an increased incidence of tropical diseases, including Dengue fever.

Within this context, ECLAC has continued to include the Territories in the research we conducted related to climate change, sustainability, and resilience. In particular, a policy brief from 2022 on resilient and affordable housing in the Caribbean included information on all seven Territories. The Territories have also remained active participants in intergovernmental and capacity-building meetings in the region. Of note is the involvement of several of them in the events of the Parliamentary Observatory on Climate Change and Just Transition (OPCC), including at UNFCCC COP 27 and the first OPCC Parliamentary Summit, which took place in April this year.

# 2030 Agenda

Madam Chair,

ECLAC remains committed to actively supporting and promoting the sustainable development of the Non-Self-Governing Territories in the Caribbean and is proud to count them among its Associate Members. To that end, we especially note the support we gave to the British Virgin Islands in the drafting of their National Sustainable Development Plan which was launched in 2023. This strategy underwent extensive public consultation and emphasizes resilience throughout. In addition, the Territories remained engaged and have participated in the wide variety of intergovernmental and technical meetings, capacity-building efforts, and studies conducted by ECLAC over the past year to advance the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. While the focus of our activities continues to emphasize sustainable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, our mission to deepen the understanding of the development challenges facing the Caribbean, including the Territories, and to contribute to solutions, remains resolute.

Unfortunately, in the past few years, it has become increasingly difficult to conduct activities with the Territories, due to lack of access to funding. This is unfortunate, given the unprecedented challenges faced by the Territories due to the COVID-19 pandemic and other factors, and the numerous requests we have received from the Territories for support. This is highly concerning to the Member States of the Caribbean Development and Cooperation Committee (CDCC), which at its Twenty-ninth Session in 2022, adopted resolution 111 (XXIX) on support for the Associate Members of ECLAC, which, *inter alia*, requested the full implementation of General Assembly resolutions in support of the Associate Members, and called on ECLAC to consider annual deployment of resources for technical assistance in the design and implementation of policies.

Overall, this resolution now provides the foundation for a broadened mandate for informing the way in which ECLAC engages with the Territories and other Associate Members of ECLAC. This, together with strengthened and streamlined resolutions from the Main Bodies of the United Nations to specifically enable access to resources for delivering technical assistance and support to the Territories could create an effective framework for delivering support to the Territories.

CDCC resolution 111 (XXIX) also called on the Commission to expand its collection of data on key sectors of the Territories. To that end, ECLAC is exploring an initiative to establish a robust data base of economic data from the Territories. This would enable enhanced and more specific inclusion of their development experience in our publications, and thus directly contribute to strengthening government decision-making and guiding policy formulation.

Ultimately, ECLAC fully embraces the opportunity to continue our support of, and engagement with, the Territories to address the aforementioned challenges and promote their sustainable development aspirations in building a more productive, inclusive and sustainable future.
