## **Introduction**

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development ([A/70/1](#)) contain several targets that are related to migration. One target requires relevant SDG indicators to be disaggregated by migratory status (SDG 17.18). These two sessions will focus on indicators that are **relevant to migration**, which are either **migration-related indicators** (Session V) or **relevant for disaggregation by migratory status** (Section VI). The purpose of these sessions is to (a) promote a common understanding of the SDG indicators that are relevant to migration, and (b) assess progress in developing and measuring these indicators.

## **Session V**

Custodian (and co-custodian) agencies for **10 migration-related indicators** (Annex I) have been invited to make a presentation, which should not last for more than 7 minutes. Presentations should focus on issues such as methodology, measurement and data collection, with a specific focus on indicators currently classified as Tier II and Tier III.<sup>1</sup>

## **Section VI**

The Statistics Division of UN DESA will present a tentative list of **24 indicators relevant for disaggregation by migratory status** (Annex II), which was established during an expert group meeting in June 2017.<sup>2</sup> Participants are invited to provide their feedback on this list. These views and inputs will be useful in the further development of this list by the group of experts.
