DESCRIPTION OF THE INTERACTIVE SESSION

The demographic processes experienced in most countries in Latin America over the last century are characterized by changes in mortality and fertility compressed into a very short period. As a result, population ageing has increased at an unprecedented pace that might be sustained well into the middle of the 21st century

Many changes are expected, we need a better understanding of the changing relationship between family, economics and health issues related to an increase of the size of this population group. Also, it is crucial to think in future scenarios that take into account the changing profiles, perceptions, intergenerational relationships and economic situations.

To do so, countries and society must build infrastructure and institutions to face ageing challenges. It is necessary to develop information and research studies to observe and explain these profiles and relationships. We must take advantage of longitudinal studies that incorporate measures of health, economic status, family, and well-being, such as the Mexican Health and Ageing Study.

We need to be aware of this new demographic reality, its implications and what we can do to take advantage of the population ageing.
