

The Republic of El Salvador submits this report in response to resolution 70/114, in which it strongly urged States to take all necessary measures to ensure that crimes committed by officials and experts from the United Nations mission, not go unpunished and those responsible for such crimes are brought to justice.

In any peacekeeping mission with the participation of members of the Armed Forces of El Salvador, they are committed to respecting the laws and customs of the country where they are, which is expressly stated in the Memorandum of Understanding that subscribe to each mission. This is intended to avoid the participating personnel is involved in offenses as serious in Salvadoran legislation or legislation of the country where the mission is carried out.

In addition, in order to ensure the prevention of crime, various trainings are conducted for staff performs according to regulations, including the Code of Personal Conduct for Blue Helmets of the United Nations and other rules of behavior.

Also as part of prior control of participants, certified personnel associated with operations peacekeeping, in order to prevent those involved in some type of criminal offense including those of sex, corruption character, financial crimes extends , violations of human rights or Humanitarian international law -participate in such operations.

Regarding the incidents, currently the Armed Forces of El Salvador has no record of Salvadoran personnel who have committed serious crimes during its participation in a peacekeeping mission, despite the legal duty to carry out an investigation and exercise of jurisdiction is recognized presented specific cases.
