His name is Tilenenge Nyitor, an IDP displaced from Tse Ta-avaan, resident on Camp 1 in Daudu community of Guma local government.

They sought to know what I can do as you can see, I am physically challenged. This is how I was born so I told them clearly that I can learn welding. All my life I never knew I can ever acquire such (skills) but today I have met with people that will pay all my training fees and have me learn this on like before when I use to seat on the camp ideal on a daily basis without nothing to do rather than play draft and WHOT, now I feel so busy”*.

Answer: I feel so happy and I have knowledge on so many things. I now have the idea and skills to construct doors, gates, burglary proofs etc.
