Decent jobs for forcibly displaced youth in LDCs

The session will discuss the challenges and opportunities to support forcibly displaced youth in LDCs, including refugees, IDPs and host community youth, secure a smooth transition into decent work. Recognizing the resilience and creativity of forcibly displaced youth to shape their futures as well as the vital role youth employment stakeholders including governments, the private sector and youth-led organisations can play in helping these young people realise their full potential, this event will spotlight innovative solutions supporting young refugees and host community youth access decent jobs.

The event seeks to: (1) Discuss the socio-economic challenges faced by forcibly displaced youth in LDCs and opportunities to address them. (2) Facilitate an interactive conversation among young people and youth employment stakeholders on solutions to support forcibly displaced youth access decent jobs. (3) Spotlight initiatives that meaningfully engage young people in shaping policy solutions and programmes.

Becoming leaders: Young women scientists from LDCs share their stories

This session will demonstrate how specialised networks, tools and resources can be developed to support young women scientists from Least Developed Countries (LDCs) to step into positions of leadership and influence in scientific research and policy making in their own countries. These networks also provide mechanisms for participation in scientific research and decision making at the global level, ensuring that the ideas, challenges, solutions and innovations offered by such women can be considered and implemented around the world, having a positive impact on communities and contributing to the excellence and relevance of scientific research in general.

Three young women scientists from LDCs (Rep of Congo, Yemen and Nepal) will describe their personal success stories. Two of these women are also the protagonists of short videos made to celebrate their careers, which will be shown. Senior women mentors who have played significant roles in supporting young women scientists will also contribute, including the Minister of Science from Rep. of Congo; the Vice President of TWAS and of OWSD; as well as the Chair of the OWSD Jordan National chapter who has set up a mentoring circle. The executive director of TWAS, Romain Murenzi will also comment on

TWAS's major contribution to creating networks of scientific excellence in the developing world. Panelists will use short 'Ignite-style' talks to ensure the session is engaging and inspiring and there will be ample time for discussion. Tonya Blowers, Coordinator of OWSD will moderate the session.
