Session 1: Presentation on the Doha Programme of Action for LDCs (DPoA) and the Fifth UN Conference on the Least Developed Countries (LDC5)

The Doha Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2022-2031 (DPoA) was adopted on 17 March 2022. The General Assembly endorsed the DPoA on 1 April 2022. The overarching goals of the DPoA are to achieve rapid, sustainable and inclusive recovery from the pandemic, build resilience against future shocks, eradicate extreme poverty, enable graduation from LDC category, ensure access to sustainable and innovating financing, leverage the power of science and technology and innovation, bring structural transformation and achieve SDGs. It comprises an ambitious, comprehensive and wide-ranging set of actions and targets. The LDC5 will be held in Doha, Qatar from 5 to 9 March 2023.

Session 3: Updates on status of implementation of national development plans

The DPoA represents a new generation of renewed and strengthened commitments between the LDCs and their development partners, including governments and all other stakeholders. It falls largely within the remaining decade of the 2030 Agenda. How to dovetail implementation of the DPoA with the SDGs so as to best use limited resources and achieve effective delivery is a challenge. The COVID-19 pandemic has exerted disproportionate impacts on LDCs. Albeit in a much slower pace, LDCs are forecasted to recover from the shock brought by the pandemic and realize the aspirations of achieving long-term resilient and sustainable. In this session, the NFPs will brief participants on domestic frameworks for the design and timeline of national development strategies, and update on their implementation. They will also shed light on challenges in building coherence between the DPoA and the SDGs amidst constraints entailed by the COVID-19 pandemic, and in mainstreaming the new targets and commitments contained the DPoA into respective national development plans.

The NFPs are also expected to identify areas where capacity building initiatives are needed.
