

Message from H.E. Rabab Fatima, Ambassador and Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations on the occasion of the commemoration of the signing of the Charter of the United Nations, 26 June 2020, New York

The Charter of the UN embodies the highest and finest ideals, values, and principles and remains the best blueprint for humankind's altruistic pursuit. As the Father of the Nation of Bangladesh, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in his maiden address to the General Assembly said, "In a world that is marked by strife and human misery, the United Nations remains the focus of man's hope for the future." This encapsulates Bangladesh's abiding trust and confidence in the UN and its Charter. And this year's 75th anniversary commemoration event assumes special significance for us as it coincides with the Birth Centenary of our Founding Father.
