**Subject: Informal Summary – Pact for the Future Informal Interactive Dialogue one**

Excellency,

I have the honour to circulate the summary of the informal interactive dialogue on the Implementation of the Pact for the Future – Means of Implementation, which I convened on 26 March 2025.

This informal interactive dialogue was the first in a series of three dialogues that aim to support Pact implementation efforts by creating a platform for Member States to exchange views, share best practices and ideas as they further implementation efforts at the national level. The insights and perspectives shared during the dialogue provide actionable pathways to operationalizing the commitments contained in the Pact and its annexes, in a manner that reflects differing national contexts and realities.

Some of the key elements that were highlighted include the strengthening of national leadership and ownership of the Pact which is essential to translating global commitments into results. This would also advance the development of national implementation roadmaps that feature clear objectives, timelines, institutional responsibilities, and measurable indicators to ensure focus and track progress. In line with this, the promotion of inclusive and localized planning to ensure that Pact implementation responds to national and local needs was also emphasized.

Cognizant that implementation efforts are not being undertaken in isolation, leveraging existing institutional mechanisms such as national SDG frameworks and the UN resident coordinator system—for implementation, technical support, and monitoring was underscored.

Translating the Pact's commitments and annexes into national policy frameworks was highlighted as a key step toward institutionalizing implementation and ensuring long-term accountability.

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The potential role of regional and thematic centres of excellence was also emphasized—as platforms to support knowledge-sharing, technology transfer, and specialized training tailored to national and local priorities.

Finally, robust and inclusive monitoring frameworks, strengthened national data systems, and shared responsibility at all levels remain critical to ensuring transparent, results-driven implementation of the Pact.

The Pact for the Future must serve as a catalyst for long-term systemic change rather than just a short-term commitment. The perspectives gained from this dialogue contribute to that goal as they are not only meaningful but also have the potential of shaping implementation efforts at the national level.

I encourage all Member States to consider the good practices shared during the dialogue as inspiration for their own implementation pathways, in ways that reflect their national contexts and priorities. Continued progress at the national level will be essential to achieving the transformative ambitions of the Pact. I also encourage the ongoing exchange of experiences among states and other stakeholders, which can foster mutual learning and strengthen collective efforts.

I look forward to our continued engagement in maintaining the momentum for the full and effective implementation of the Pact for the Future.
