### In accordance with Security Council resolution 2129 (2013)



the Committee, with the support of CTED, launched the Global Counter-Terrorism Research Network to further engage and enhance its partnerships with, among others, academia, think tanks and other entities in conducting research and information-gathering, and identifying good practices.
