**AFRICA**

**DRC: MONUSCO mandate**

Resolution 2348 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para. 26: Decides to extend until 31 March 2018 the mandate of MONUSCO in the DRC, including, on an exceptional basis and without creating a precedent or any prejudice to the agreed principles of peacekeeping, its Intervention Brigade;

The mandate will expire on 31 March 2018.

**DRC: SG to conduct strategic review of MONUSCO and provide the SC with options, provide advice on exit strategy**

Resolution 2348 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para. 51: Requests the Secretary-General, in accordance with best practices, to conduct a strategic review of MONUSCO, examining the continued relevance of all mandated tasks, priorities and related resources, as well as necessity to adapt the Mission's mandate to the specific needs of the post-elections phase, with a view to:

Para. 51: (a) Providing the Security Council with options, no later than 30 September 2017, for a reduction of MONUSCO's Force and civilian components in order to maximize the efficient use of the Mission's resources, to be delivered after the successful implementation of the 31 December 2016 agreement, and sustainable progress in reducing the threat of armed groups, taking account of the Mission and the UNCT's comparative advantages, capacities and other relevant factors, with a view to transferring relevant activities to the UNCT and other relevant partners, as appropriate; and

Para. 51: (b) In light of the Security Council's reaction to these options and following successful implementation of the 31 December 2016 agreement, providing advice to the Security Council on an exit strategy, in line with paragraph 50 above and in advance of the next mandate renewal;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**DRC: SG reports on MONUSCO**

Resolution 2348 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para. 52: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every three months on the implementation of MONUSCO's mandate, including its Intervention Brigade, as set out in this resolution, including on:

(i) progress made by the DRC on the implementation of the 31 December 2016 agreement and the electoral process, including on the provisions of paragraphs 1 to 6 above, as well as on the ways in which MONUSCO will be best prepared to address security risks and to monitor and report on human rights violations and abuses in the context of the elections, including in terms of deployment of the Force in areas identified as potential zones of instability and configuration of civilian and police

component of MONUSCO, sexual violence and the impact of conflict on women and children, and any gender considerations made;

(ii) the situation on the ground, including updates on operations to neutralize armed groups, in accordance with paragraph 34.i.d, and any instances where the Mission is not effectively fulfilling its protection of civilians mandate, and the circumstances surrounding these instances;

(iii) progress made by the DRC on protecting human rights and in the implementation of its commitments under the PSC Framework, including through the establishment and implementation of a national SSR roadmap, its provincial stabilisation plan supported by the ISSSS and on the implementation of the DDR and DRRR plans;

(iv) progress in the implementation of the measures taken to transform MONUSCO's Force and improve its performance, including measures to ensure Force effectiveness as outlined in paragraphs 44 to 47, the deployment of rapidly deployable battalions and employment of the Intervention Brigade's capabilities, to become more mobile, efficient and effective in implementing its mandate, and on the definition of an exit strategy for MONUSCO, including the Intervention Brigade;

(v) the risks and their implications for the safety and the security for the United Nations personnel and facilities as a result of the possible military operations as well as measures taken to strengthen their security and mitigate risks;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

#### **DRC: SG reports on implementation of the commitments under the PSC Framework**

Resolution 2348 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para. 54: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council every six months, in coordination with the Secretary-General's Special Envoy for the Great Lakes Region and the SRSG for the DRC on the implementation of the commitments under the PSC Framework and its linkages with the broader security situation in the Great Lakes Region;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

#### **DRC: SG to update SC in writing on implementation of the 31 December 2016 agreement**

Resolution 2348 (2017) of 31 March 2017

Para. 53: Requests the Secretary-General to update the Security Council in writing every 45 days on political and technical progress and obstacles to the implementation of the 31 December 2016 agreement, when no regular reports are due;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 15 February 2018 (S/2018/128) is before the Security Council.

#### **Liberia: UNMIL mandate**

Resolution 2333 (2016) of 23 December 2016

Para.10: Decides to extend the mandate of UNMIL as set out in paragraph 11 for a final period until 30 March 2018, and requests the Secretary-General to complete by 30 April 2018 the withdrawal of all uniformed and civilian UNMIL components, other than those required to complete the Mission's liquidation;

The mandate will expire on 30 March 2018.

**Libya: UNSMIL: SG to report to SC on the implementation of resolution 2376 (2017)**

Resolution 2376 (2017) of 14 September 2017

Para.7: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Security Council on the implementation of this resolution at least every 60 days;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 20 February 2018 (S/2018/140) is before the Security Council.

**Libya: Sanctions: Committee reports**

Resolution 1970 (2011) of 26 February 2011

Para.24: Decides to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of its provisional rules of procedure, a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council (herein “the Committee”), to undertake to following tasks:

(e) To report within thirty days to the Security Council on its work for the first report and thereafter to report as deemed necessary by the Committee.

The Committee is expected to report in March 2018.

**Mali: SG reports on MINUSMA on the implementation of resolution 2364 (2017)**

Resolution 2364 (2017) of 29 June 2017

Para.47: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council every three months after the adoption of this resolution on the implementation of this resolution, focusing:

(i) on the progress in the implementation of the Agreement on Peace and Reconciliation in Mali and on MINUSMA’s efforts to support it, including through the benchmarks and timelines agreed between the Government of Mali and MINUSMA in December 2016, pursuant to resolution [2295 \(2016\)](#);

(ii) on progress in the implementation of the measures taken to improve MINUSMA’s effectiveness to implement its mandate, as outlined in paragraphs 31 to 36 above, including measures to enhance the safety and security of MINUSMA’s personnel;

(iii) on coordination and exchange of information between MINUSMA, French forces and the FC-G5S as outlined in paragraph 42 above;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**Mali: Report by France on implementation of mandate to support MINUSMA**

Resolution 2364 (2017) of 29 June 2017

Para.37: Authorizes French forces, within the limits of their capacities and areas of deployment, to use all necessary means until the end of MINUSMA’s mandate as authorized in this resolution, to intervene in support of elements of MINUSMA when under imminent and serious threat upon request of the Secretary-General, and requests France to report to the Council on the implementation of this mandate in Mali and to coordinate its reporting with the reporting by the Secretary-General referred to in paragraph 47 below;

**Mali: Sanctions: Panel of Experts interim update and final report**

Resolution 2374 (2017) of 5 September 2017

Para.11: (c) Provide to the Council, after discussion with the Committee, an interim update by March, 1, 2018, and a final report by September, 1, 2018, and periodic updates in between;

The Panel of Experts' interim update is expected to be provided by 1 March 2018.

**Somalia: UNSOM mandate**

Resolution 2358 (2017) of 14 June 2017

Para.1: Decides to extend UNSOM's mandate as set out in paragraph 1 resolution [2158 \(2014\)](#) until 31 March 2018;

The mandate will expire on 31 March 2018.

**Somalia: SG report on the future funding of AMISOM**

Resolution 2372 (2017) of 30 August 2017

Para.32: Stresses the need to enhance the predictability, sustainability and flexibility of financing for African Union-led peace support operations authorized by the Security Council and under the Security Council's authority consistent with Chapter VIII of the Charter, urges the Secretary-General, African Union and partners to explore in earnest funding arrangements for AMISOM, bearing in mind the full range of options available to the United Nations, African Union, the European Union, and to other partners, and considering the limitations of voluntary funding, in order to establish secure future funding arrangements for AMISOM, and looks forward to the Secretary-General's report on the future funding of AMISOM by November 2017;

PSC letter of 4 December 2017 (S/2017/1018)

I have the honour to inform you that your letter dated 30 November 2017 (S/2017/1017) concerning your intention to submit the report on the future funding of the African Union Mission in Somalia by the end of February 2018, has been brought to the attention of the members of the Security Council. They take note of the information contained in your letter and the intention expressed therein.

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**Somalia: Sanctions: 751/1907 Committee (Somalia/Eritrea) briefings to SC**

Resolution 1844 (2008) of 20 November 2008

Para.11: Decides further to expand the mandate of the Committee as set out in resolution 751(1992) to include the following tasks:

(g) to report at least every 120 days to the Security Council on its work and on the implementation of this resolution, with its observations and recommendations, in particular on ways to strengthen the effectiveness of the measures imposed by paragraphs 1, 3 and 7 above.

The Committee is expected to report in March 2018.

**Somalia: Sanctions: Federal Government of Somalia to report to SC**

Resolution 2385 (2017) of 14 November 2017

Para.8: Welcomes the improvement in FGS reporting to the Security Council pursuant to paragraph 9 of resolution [2182 \(2014\)](#) and as requested in paragraph 7 of resolution [2244 \(2015\)](#), calls on the FGS

and FMS to implement the National Security Architecture, and the Security Pact, agreed at the London Conference on Somalia which set out to provide Somali-led security and protection to the people of Somalia, and requests the FGS to report to the Security Council in accordance with paragraph 9 of resolution [2182 \(2014\)](#) and as requested in paragraph 7 of resolution [2244 \(2015\)](#) on the structure, composition, strength and disposition of its Security Forces, including the status of regional and militia forces by 30 March 2018 and then by 30 September 2018;

**South Sudan: UNMISS mandate**

Resolution 2392 (2017) of 14 December 2017

Para. 1: Decides to extend the mandate of the United Nations Mission in the Republic of South Sudan (UNMISS), as set out in resolution [2327 \(2016\)](#), until 15 March 2018, and authorizes UNMISS to use all necessary means to carry out its tasks;

The mandate will expire on 15 March 2018.

**South Sudan: SG to provide detailed information on UNMISS force, impediments and obstructions**

Resolution 2327 (2016) of 16 December 2016

Para. 31: Requests that the Secretary-General provide detailed information within 30 days on force generation, restructuring of the UNMISS force, logistical support and enablers, and civilian personnel to implement the mandate, as well as whether the TGNU has maintained its consent in principle to deployment of the RPF and not imposed any political or operational impediments to operationalizing the RPF or obstructed UNMISS in the performance of its mandate, and requests the Secretary-General to review needs on the ground, and provide an updated assessment of the RPF's operations, deployment, and future requirements, as well as any political or operational impediments to operationalizing the RPF and obstructions to UNMISS in performance of its mandate, within 30 days after the adoption of this resolution, and every 30 days thereafter;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected in March 2018.

**South Sudan: SG report on implementation of the UNMISS mandate**

Resolution 2327 (2016) of 16 December 2016

Para. 32: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on implementation of the UNMISS mandate including UNMISS' RPF as well as to report on progress in implementing the HRDDP per paragraph 17 above, an update on how UNMISS is working toward fulfilling its protection of civilian duties, including but not limited to new patrol areas and proactive deployment per paragraph 15 above, and the consideration of gender as cross cutting through the mandate per paragraph 14 above, and to present the recommendations on the steps to adapt UNMISS to the situation on the ground and to increase efficiency of the implementation of its mandate in a same comprehensive written report to be submitted within 90 days of the date of adoption of this resolution, and every 90 days thereafter;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 27 February 2018 (S/2018/163) is before the Security Council.

## **Sudan: SG reports on UNAMID**

### Resolution 2363 (2017) of 29 June 2017

Para.41: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every 60 days following adoption of this resolution on UNAMID, including:

- (i) information on the political, humanitarian and security situation in Darfur, including detailed reporting on incidents of violence and attacks against civilians, including sexual and gender-based violence, by whomsoever perpetrated;
- (ii) information on violations of the Status of Forces Agreement, including those involving attacks or threats of attack on UNAMID, violations of international humanitarian law perpetrated by any party to the conflict, as well as access restrictions and significant operational obstacles such as those related to customs clearances and visas;
- (iii) developments and progress towards achievement of UNAMID's strategic priorities and benchmarks;
- (iv) progress in the implementation of the recommendations made in the Special Report, including the progress of reductions to UNAMID's military and police component and its impact, including on protection needs and violations and abuses of human rights;
- (v) developments and progress on strategically addressing the underlying drivers of inter-communal conflict and the action plan on the prevention and resolution of inter-communal conflict;
- (vi) developments and progress in addressing the challenges facing UNAMID;
- (vii) enhanced, detailed and full information on abuses and violations of human rights, including those committed against women and children and violations of international humanitarian law;
- (viii) developments regarding UNAMID's support for local conflict resolution mechanisms, including progress regarding the full and effective participation of women; and
- (ix) on the implementation of this resolution;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 22 February 2018 (S/2018/154) is before the Security Council.

## **Sudan/South Sudan: Consider reviewing UNISFA's mandate to support the JBVMM**

### Resolution 2386 (2017) of 15 November 2017

Para.9: Determines to consider renewing UNISFA's mandate to support the JBVMM should both parties adhere to the specific measures agreed to in the May and October 2017 JPSM communiqués no later than 15 March 2018, to include completing inter alia:

- (1) Facilitating the full freedom of movement for UNISFA air and ground patrols, to include landing within the SDBZ, by approving 100 percent of requested sorties no later than 72 hours after the requests are delivered,
- (2) Opening of Phase I of the border crossing corridors,
- (3) Holding at least one meeting to resume border demarcation discussions, including negotiations on the disputed areas within the framework of the signed agreements, welcomes the African Union Commission's efforts in this regard and encourages its continued assistance to the parties,
- (4) Reactivating the ad hoc committee of the 14 mile area,
- (5) Facilitating the operationalization of the four JBVMM team sites, and,
- (6) Convening at least two meetings of the JPSM to resolve these issues;

The Security Council will consider reviewing the mandate should both parties adhere to specific measures agreed to no later than 15 March 2018.

**Sudan/South Sudan: SG written report on UNISFA**

Resolution 2386 (2017) of 15 November 2017

Para.32: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to inform the Council of progress in implementing UNISFA's mandate, including reporting on any steps taken per paragraph 9, in one written report, no later than 1 April 2018 and continue to bring to the Council's immediate attention any serious violations of the above referenced Agreements;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**Western Sahara: SG to update SC on ways in which the Personal Envoy is progressing; MINURSO's performance measures; structures and staffing; new technologies**

Resolution 2351 (2017) of 28 April 2017

Para.11: Further requests the Secretary-General to update the Security Council within six months of the appointment of the new Personal Envoy on (i) ways in which the Personal Envoy, working with the parties, is progressing towards a mutually acceptable political solution, which will provide for the self-determination of the people of Western Sahara in the context of arrangements consistent with the principles and purposes of the Charter of the United Nations, and present a clear path forward; (ii) how MINURSO's performance measures are being developed and implemented (iii) how structures and staffing can be reorganized to achieve mission goals efficiently, and (iv) how new technologies are being considered to reduce risk, improve force protection, and better implement the mandate of MINURSO

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2018.

**AMERICAS**

**Colombia: SG to report on Verification Mission**

Resolution 2366 (2017) of 10 July 2017

Para.8: Further requests the Secretary-General, based on the reporting of the Special Representative, to report to the Security Council on the implementation of the Verification Mission's mandate every 90 days after the start of its verification activities;

**Colombia: SG reporting on verification of ceasefire between the Government of Colombia and the ELN**

Resolution 2381 (2017) of 5 October 2017

Para.4: Welcomes the Secretary-General's proposal to incorporate reporting with respect to the verification of the ceasefire within the reporting cycle already established by resolution [2366 \(2017\)](#), and requests an additional update to the Security Council on the implementation of the tasks mandated by this resolution by 8 December 2017.

The report of the Secretary General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**Haiti: SG reports on the implementation of resolution 2350 (2017)**

Resolution 2350 (2017) of 13 April 2017

Para.21: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on the implementation of this resolution, including any instances of mandate implementation failures, within 90 days and 180 days from its adoption, as well as in an assessment report 30 days before the expiration of MINUJUSTH's initial mandate;



Para.22: Requests that the initial 90 day report include details on the joint MINUSTAH and UNCT Transition Plan referred to in paragraph 20, and further requests that the assessment report referenced in paragraph 21 set out a well-developed and clearly benchmarked projected two-year exit strategy to a non-peacekeeping United Nations presence in Haiti to continue supporting the efforts of the Government of Haiti in sustaining peace and peacebuilding;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

### **Afghanistan: UNAMA mandate**

Resolution 2344 (2017) of 17 March 2017

Para. 3: Decides to extend until 17 March 2018 the mandate of UNAMA, as defined in its resolutions [1662 \(2006\)](#), [1746 \(2007\)](#), [1806 \(2008\)](#), [1868 \(2009\)](#), [1917 \(2010\)](#), [1974 \(2011\)](#), [2041 \(2012\)](#), [2096 \(2013\)](#), [2145 \(2014\)](#), [2210 \(2015\)](#), [2274 \(2016\)](#) and paragraphs 5 and 6 below;

The mandate will expire on 17 March 2018.

### **Afghanistan: SG reports on UNAMA**

Resolution 2344 (2017) of 17 March 2017

Para. 37: Requests that the Secretary-General reports to the Council every three months on developments in Afghanistan, and to include in his reports an evaluation of progress made against the benchmarks for measuring and tracking progress in the implementation of UNAMA's mandate, including at the subnational level, and priorities as set out in this resolution;

The report of the Secretary-General dated 27 February 2018 (S/2018/165) is before the Security Council.

### **Middle East: The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question**

Resolution 1322 (2000) of 7 October 2000

Para.7: Invites the Secretary-General to continue to follow the situation and to keep the Security Council informed.

### **The situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian Question: SG to report to the Council on the implementation of resolution 2334 (2016)**

Resolution 2334 (2016) of 23 December 2016

Para.12: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council every three months on the implementation of the provisions of the present resolution;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2018.

### **Middle East (Lebanon/UNIFIL): SG reports on implementation of resolution 1701 (2006)**

Resolution 2373 (2017) of 30 August 2017

Para.18: Requests the Secretary-General to continue to report to the Council on the implementation of resolution 1701 (2006), every four months, or at any time as he deems appropriate, and to include in

his reporting a prompt and detailed breakdown of all resolution 1701 (2006) violations, prompt and detailed reports on violations of the sovereignty of Lebanon, prompt and detailed reports on the restrictions to UNIFIL's freedom of movement, reports on specific areas where UNIFIL does not access and on the reasons behind these restrictions, potential risks to the cessation of hostilities and UNIFIL's response as well as reports on the implementation of the recommendations of the 2016-2017 Strategic review and on additional identified efficiencies to most appropriately fulfil its mandated tasks; requests the Secretary-General to further develop a reporting mechanism in order to provide concrete and detailed information on the aforementioned issues to the Council;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**Middle East (Syria): OPCW DG to report to SC (through SG) on impl. of resolution 2118 (2013)**  
Resolution 2118 (2013) of 27 September 2013

Para.12: Decides to review on a regular basis the implementation in the Syrian Arab Republic of the decision of the OPCW Executive Council of 27 September 2013 and this resolution, and requests the Director-General of the OPCW to report to the Security Council, through the Secretary-General, who shall include relevant information on United Nations activities related to the implementation of this resolution, within 30 days and every month thereafter, and requests further the Director-General of the OPCW and the Secretary-General to report in a coordinated manner, as needed, to the Security Council, non-compliance with this resolution or the OPCW Executive Council decision of 27 September 2013.

The report is expected to be presented in March 2018.

**Middle East (Syria): SG to report on implementation of resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015), 2332 (2016) and 2393 (2017)**  
Resolution 2139 (2014) of 22 February 2014

Para.17: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution by all parties in Syria, in particular paragraphs 2 through 12, in 30 days of its adoption and every 30 days thereafter, and upon receipt of the Secretary-General's report, expresses its intent to take further steps in the case of non-compliance with this resolution;

Resolution 2393 (2017) of 19 December 2017

Para.6: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, and on compliance by all relevant parties in Syria, within the framework of its reporting on resolutions [2139 \(2014\)](#), [2165 \(2014\)](#), [2191 \(2014\)](#), [2258 \(2015\)](#) and [2332 \(2016\)](#) and further requests the Secretary-General to include in his monthly reports overall trends in UN cross-line and cross-border humanitarian access, and more detailed information on the humanitarian assistance delivered through UN humanitarian cross-border operations as authorized by UNSCR [2165 \(2014\)](#), including on the number of beneficiaries, locations of aid deliveries at district-level, and the volume and nature of items delivered;

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**Middle East (Syria): SG report on implementation of resolution 2401 (2018)**

Resolution 2401 (2018) of 24 February 2018

Para. 12. Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, and on compliance by all relevant parties in Syria, within 15 days of adoption of this resolution and thereafter within the framework of its reporting on resolutions 2139 (2014), 2165 (2014), 2191 (2014), 2258 (2015), 2332 (2016) and 2393 (2017);

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2018.

**Middle East (Syria): SG report on the implementation of resolution 2268 (2016)**

Resolution 2268 (2016) of 26 February 2016

Para.10: Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of this resolution, including by drawing on information provided by the ISSG ceasefire taskforce, and on resolution 2254 (2015), within 15 days of the adoption of this resolution and every 30 days thereafter;

The Secretary-General is expected to report in March 2018.

**Middle East (UNDOF): SG reports on developments in the situation and measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973)**

Resolution 2394 (2017) of 21 December 2017

Para.12: Requests the Secretary-General to report every 90 days on developments in the situation and the measures taken to implement resolution 338 (1973).

The report of the Secretary-General is expected to be issued in March 2018.

**OTHER**

**Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: SC to review Panel of Experts mandate**

Resolution 2345 (2017) on 23 March 2017

Para.1: Decides to extend until 24 April 2018 the mandate of the Panel of Experts, as specified in paragraph 26 of resolution 1874 (2009) and modified in paragraph 29 of resolution 2094 (2013), decides that this mandate shall apply also with respect to the measures imposed in resolution 2321 (2016), expresses its intent to review the mandate and take appropriate action regarding further extension no later than 24 March 2018, and requests the Secretary-General to take the necessary administrative measures to this effect;

The Security Council intends to review the mandate and take appropriate action no later than 24 March 2018.

**Non-proliferation/DPRK: Sanctions: Panel of Experts final report**

Resolution 2345 (2017) on 23 March 2017

Para.2: Requests the Panel of Experts to provide to the Committee no later than 5 August 2017 a midterm report on its work, as requested in paragraph 43 of resolution 2321 (2016), and further requests that, after a discussion with the Committee, the Panel of Experts submit to the Council its midterm report by 6 September 2017, and requests also a final report to the Committee no later than 1 February 2018 with

its findings and recommendations, and further requests that, after a discussion with the Committee, the Panel of Experts submit to the Council its final report no later than 14 March 2018;

The Panel of Experts' final report is expected to be provided no later than 14 March 2018.
