

# Index to Proceedings of the Security Council

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Forty-ninth year — 1994



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## INTRODUCTION

The Security Council is the organ of the United Nations which has primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security under the Charter of the United Nations. The Council, which is composed of 15 members, is organized so as to be able to function continuously.

The *Index to Proceedings of the Security Council* is a guide to the documentation and proceedings of the Security Council, its commissions, committees and *ad hoc* committees. The present issue covers the forty-ninth year (1994) of the Security Council and its sub-bodies which met during the year. The Index is prepared by the Dag Hammarskjöld Library, Department of Public Information, as one of the products of the United Nations Bibliographic Information System (UNBIS).

### ARRANGEMENT OF THE INDEX

The Index consists of the following parts:

**Sessional information**, listing members and officers, and providing information on rules of procedure and on resolutions and decisions;

**Check-list of meetings**, listing the meetings of the Council and those of its subsidiary bodies that met during the year;

**Agenda**, listing matters considered by and brought before the Council together with the subject headings under which these items are listed in the Subject index;

**Subject index**, providing topical access to Security Council documentation arranged alphabetically by subjects and listing documents submitted to the Council, the meetings at which items were considered and the action taken, if any;

**Index to speeches**, providing access to speeches that were made before the Security Council. The index is subdivided into three sections: corporate names/countries, speakers and subjects;

**List of documents**, listing documents arranged by symbol;

**Resolutions adopted by the Security Council, 1994**, listing resolution numbers, the subjects under which they may be found in the Subject index, as well as meetings

and dates on which the resolutions were adopted;

**Voting chart**, indicating the voting for resolutions adopted by the Council.

### DOCUMENTATION OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL

Documents of the Security Council are first issued in provisional form. A selected number of them are subsequently printed in the quarterly *Supplements to Official Records*, where they are arranged chronologically. Some special reports are issued individually as numbered *Special Supplements*. Resolutions adopted by the Security Council and statements made by its President, first issued in provisional form, are later collected along with decisions taken, in a separate volume of the *Official Records* of the year. After their republication in the *Official Records*, the provisional documents are no longer available.

Double-symbol documents bearing both S/- and A/- symbols were submitted to both the Security Council and the General Assembly.

Verbatim records of meetings of the Security Council appear first in provisional form. They may be identified by their symbol, which consists of the series corresponding to that of the meeting, e.g., S/PV.3334. Verbatim records of meetings are later printed as separate fascicles in the *Official Records*.

Welcomes the report of the Secretary-General of 10 Jan. 1994 and agrees with the proposals contained therein concerning the mandate and size of UNOMSA, including the proposals for the coordination of the activities of the international observers provided by OAU, the Commonwealth and the European Union as well as those provided by any other intergovernmental organizations or Governments; urges all parties in South Africa, including those which did not participate fully in the multi-party talks, to respect agreements reached during the negotiations, to adhere to democratic principles, and to take part in the elections; calls upon all parties in South Africa to take measures to end the violence and intimidation and thus contribute to the conduct of free and fair elections, and expects that anyone who seeks to disrupt the elections will be held accountable for such actions; calls also upon all parties in South Africa to respect the safety and security of the international observers and to facilitate the carrying out of their mandate; welcomes the intention of the Secretary-General to set up a special Trust Fund to finance the participation of additional observers from Africa and other developing countries and urges States to contribute generously to this Fund (adopted unanimously, 3329th meeting, 14 Jan. 1994).

Welcomes the final report of the Secretary-General on UNOMSA; commends the vital role played by the Special Representative of the Secretary-General and UNOMSA, together with OAU, the Commonwealth and the European Union, in support of the establishment of a united, non-racial and democratic South Africa; decides that, with the successful completion of its mandate, UNOMSA is terminated forthwith; also decides that it has concluded its consideration of the item entitled "The question of South Africa" and hereby removes this item from the list of matters of which the Council is seized (adopted unanimously, 3393rd meeting, 27 June 1994).

S/RES/933 (1994) [Extension of the mandate of UNMIH].

Under Chapter VII of the Charter of UN, authorizes Member States to form a multinational force under unified command and control and to use all necessary means to facilitate the departure from Haiti of the military leadership, the prompt return of the legitimately elected President and legitimate authorities of the Government of Haiti, the cost of implementing this temporary operation to be borne by the participating Member States; approves establishment, of an advance team of UNMIH of not more than 60 personnel, to establish coordination with the multinational force and to prepare for deployment of UNMIH upon completion of the multinational force's mission; decides that the multinational force will terminate its mission and UNMIH will assume its functions described below when a secure and stable environment has been established, the determination to be made by the Security Council based on the assessment of the commander of the multinational force; decides to revise and extend the mandate of UNMIH for a period of 6 months to assist the democratic Government to: (a) sustain a stable environment, (b) professionalize the Haitian armed forces and create a separate police force and assist the legitimate government in establishing an environment conducive to the holding of free and fair elections, to be monitored by UN and OAS; decides to increase the troop level of UNMIH to 6,000 and establishes the objective of completing UNMIH's mission not later than Feb. 1996; demands that no acts of intimidation or violence be directed against personnel engaged in humanitarian or peace-keeping work; affirms that the Council will review the measures imposed with a view to lifting them in their entirety, immediately following the return to Haiti of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide (adopted 12-0-2, 3413th meeting, 31 July 1994).

Requests the Secretary-General to take steps to ensure the immediate completion of the deployment of the observers and other elements of the 60-person UNMIH advance team established under resolution 940 (1994); urges Member States to respond promptly and positively to the Secretary-General's request for contributions to UNMIH; encourages the Secretary-General, in consultation with the Secretary-General of OAS, to continue his efforts to facilitate the immediate return to Haiti of the International Civilian Mission (MICIVIH); further decides to dissolve the Committee established under resolution 841 (1993) with effect from 0001 EST on the day after the return to Haiti of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide; requests that the Secretary-General consult with the Secretary-General of OAS regarding the consideration of appropriate measures which might be taken by that organization consistent with this resolution and report to the Council on the results of those consultations (adopted 13-0-2, 3430th meeting, 29 Sept. 1994).

Welcomes with great satisfaction the return to Haiti of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide on 15 Oct. 1994 and expresses its confidence that the people of Haiti can now begin to rebuild their country with dignity and consolidate democracy in a spirit of national reconciliation; welcomes in particular that, with the convening of the Haitian Parliament and the departure of the military leadership, the process of implementing the Governors Island Agreement, the New York Pact, and the objectives of UN as expressed in the resolutions of the Council is well under way; recognizes in particular the efforts of the Multinational Force in Haiti (MNF), authorized under resolution 940 (1994), and those of the Member States participating in the MNF on behalf of the international community in creating the conditions necessary for the return of democracy to the people of Haiti; expresses its support for the deployment of the advance team of UNMIH and the continued efforts of the Secretary-General to complete the composition of UNMIH; notes that under the terms of resolution 940 (1994) UNMIH will replace the MNF when the Security Council determines that a secure and stable environment has been established; welcomes the appointment of the new Special Representative of the Secretary-General and thanks the former Special Envoy of the Secretary-General of UN and OAS for his efforts; urges that cooperation continue between the Secretary-General of UN and OAS, especially regarding the rapid return to Haiti of the members of the International Civilian Mission (MICIVIH); welcomes the fact that, now that President Aristide has returned to Haiti, sanctions will be lifted in accordance with resolution 944 (1994) (adopted 14-0-1, 3437th meeting, 15 Oct. 1994).

S/RES/964 (1994) [Authorization to strengthen the advance team of UNMIH].

At the 3351st meeting, following a paragraph-by-paragraph vote, draft resolution S/1994/280 as a whole was adopted without vote: resolution 904 (1994).

Strongly condemns the massacre in Hebron and its aftermath which took the lives of more than 50 Palestinian civilians and injured several hundred others; calls upon Israel, the occupying Power, to continue to take and implement measures, including, inter alia, confiscation of arms, with the aim of preventing illegal acts of violence by Israeli settlers; calls for measures to be taken to guarantee the safety and protection of the Palestinian civilians throughout the occupied territory, including, inter alia, a temporary international or foreign presence, which was provided for in the Declaration of Principles (S/26560), within the context of the ongoing peace process; requests the co-sponsors of the peace process, the United States and the Russian Federation, to continue their efforts to invigorate the peace process, and to undertake the necessary support for the implementation of the above-mentioned measures; reaffirms its support for the peace process currently under way, and calls for the implementation of the Declaration of Principles, signed by the Government of Israel and the PLO on 13 Sept. 1993 in Washington, D.C., without delay (adopted without vote, 3351st meeting, 18 Mar. 1994).

S/RES/912 (1994) [Adjustment of the mandate of UNAMIR].

Condemns the ongoing violence in Rwanda, particularly in Kigali; strongly condemns attacks against UNAMIR and other UN personnel leading to death and injury and calls upon all concerned to put an end to this violence; demands an immediate cessation of hostilities between the Government of Rwanda and the Rwandese Patriotic Front; decides to adjust the mandate of UNAMIR as follows: (a) to act as an intermediary between the parties in an attempt to secure a cease-fire; (b) to assist in resumption of humanitarian relief operations to the extent feasible; (c) to monitor and report on developments in Rwanda, including the safety and security of civilians who sought refuge with UNAMIR, and authorizes a force level as set out in paragraphs 15 to 18 of the Secretary-General's report of 20 Apr. 1994; decides to keep the situation in Rwanda under review and states its readiness to consider promptly any recommendations which the Secretary-General makes concerning force level and mandate of UNAMIR; reiterates the importance of implementation of the Arusha Peace Agreement to the settlement of the conflict; invites the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the situation not later than 15 days after adoption of this resolution (adopted unanimously, 3368th meeting, 21 Apr. 1994).

S/RES/918 (1994) [Expansion of the mandate of UNAMIR and the imposition of an arms embargo on Rwanda].

S/RES/925 (1994) [Deployment of the expanded UNAMIR].  
Endorses the Secretary-General's proposals contained in his report (S/1994/640) for the deployment of the expanded UNAMIR, in particular: (a) the immediate initiation of the deployment of the 2 additional battalions in phase 2; (b) the continuation of urgent preparations for the deployment of the 2 battalions envisaged for phase 3; and (c) flexible implementation of all 3 phases to ensure effective use of available resources to accomplish the tasks of the mission; decides to extend the mandate of UNAMIR, expiring on 29 July 1994, until 9 Dec. 1994; demands that all parties to the conflict cease hostilities, agree to a cease-fire and immediately take steps to bring an end to systematic killings in areas under their control; demands further that all parties cease forthwith any incitement, especially through the mass media, to violence or ethnic hatred; urges Member States to respond promptly to the Secretary-General's request for resources, including logistical support capability for rapid deployment of additional UNAMIR forces; requests the Secretary-General to ensure that UNAMIR extend the close cooperation it has with the Department of Humanitarian Affairs and the UN Rwanda Emergency Office also to the Special Rapporteur for Rwanda appointed by the UN Commission on Human Rights; demands that all parties in Rwanda strictly respect the persons and premises of UN and other organizations serving in Rwanda, and refrain from any acts of intimidation or violence against personnel engaged in humanitarian and peace-keeping work (adopted unanimously, 3388th meeting, 8 June 1994).

S/RES/928 (1994) [Final extension of the mandate of UNOMUR].  
Decides to extend the mandate of UNOMUR for a final period of 3 months until 21 Sept. 1994 and agrees that during this period the number of military observers should be reduced by phases; requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the termination of UNOMUR before the completion of its mandate; expresses appreciation to the Government of Uganda for the cooperation and support it has extended to UNOMUR; stresses the importance of continued cooperation between the Ugandan authorities and UNOMUR (adopted unanimously, 3391st meeting, 20 June 1994).

S/RES/935 (1994) [Establishment of a Commission of Experts to examine violations of international humanitarian law committed in Rwanda].

Requests the Secretary-General to establish, as a matter of urgency, an impartial Commission of Experts to examine information submitted pursuant to the present resolution, together with further information as the Commission of Experts may obtain through the efforts of other persons or bodies, including information from the Special Rapporteur for Rwanda, with a view to providing the Secretary-General with its conclusions on violations of international humanitarian law committed in the territory of Rwanda, including evidence of possible acts of genocide; requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the establishment of the Commission of Experts, and, within 4 months from the establishment of it to report to the Council on the conclusions of the Commission; requests the Secretary-General and the High Commissioner for Human Rights to make information submitted to the Special Rapporteur for Rwanda available to the Commission of Experts and to facilitate cooperation between the Commission of Experts and the Special Rapporteur in the performance of their tasks (adopted unanimously, 3400th meeting, 1 July 1994).

Decides to extend the mandate of UNAMIR until 9 June 1995; reaffirms that UNAMIR will (a) contribute to the security and protection of displaced persons, refugees and civilians at risk in Rwanda (b) provide security and support for the distribution of relief supplies and humanitarian relief operations; (c) help achieve national reconciliation within the frame of reference of the Arusha Peace Agreement; decides to expand UNAMIR's mandate; strongly urges the Government of Rwanda to continue its cooperation with UNAMIR in the implementation of its mandate and in particular in ensuring access to all areas of Rwanda by UNAMIR forces, personnel of the International Tribunal, and human rights officers; welcomes UNAMIR's efforts to increase its radio broadcasting capabilities so as to reach the refugee camps; requests the Secretary-General to recommend possible steps that could be taken by UN to promote the establishment of a mine-clearance programme in Rwanda; calls upon the international community to provide resources needed to meet the immediate needs of the Government of Rwanda directly or through the Trust Fund established by UN; requests the Secretary-General to inform the Council should he consider that the additional tasks require consideration of an adjustment in the logistic and personnel requirements of UNAMIR (adopted unanimously, 3473rd meeting, 30 Nov. 1994).

Decides to renew the mandate of ONUSOM II for an additional period expiring on 30 Sept. 1994, subject to a review by the Council no later than 29 July 1994 based on a report by the Secretary-General on the humanitarian mission carried out by ONUSOM and on the political and security situation in Somalia and progress made in achieving national reconciliation, in the light of which report and review the Security Council may request the Secretary-General to prepare options regarding ONUSOM's mandate and future operations; strongly urges all parties in Somalia to cooperate fully with ONUSOM II, to carry out the commitments and implement the agreements which they have signed including those relating to voluntary disarmament, and to pursue without further delay the negotiations aimed at achieving national reconciliation; demands that all parties in Somalia refrain from any acts of intimidation or violence against personnel engaged in humanitarian or peace-keeping work in the country; reaffirms the obligations of States to implement fully the embargo on all deliveries of weapons and military equipment to Somalia imposed by paragraph 5 of resolution 733 (1992); welcomes the progress made by ONUSOM II in establishing the justice and police programmes and calls for their acceleration; underlines, in this context, the continuing importance of ONUSOM II having at its disposal the necessary troops, civilian personnel, equipment and financial and logistic support contributed by Member States to carry out its mandate effectively (adopted unanimously, 3385th meeting, 31 May 1994).

S/RES/946 (1994) [Extension of the mandate of UNSOM II].

Decides to extend the mandate of ONUSOM II for a period of 1 month expiring 31 Oct. 1994, prior to which the Council will undertake a thorough examination of ONUSOM's mandate with a view to deciding on its future; encourages the Secretary-General to continue with and intensify preparations of contingency arrangements for the implementation of possible decisions, including withdrawal of ONUSOM II within a specified time-frame, which the Council may take; declares its readiness to consider sending a mission of the Council to Somalia at the appropriate time in order to convey directly to the Somali political parties the views of the Council on the situation in Somalia and on the future of UN presence there (adopted 14-0-1, 3432nd meeting, 30 Sept. 1994).

S/RES/953 (1994) [Extension of the mandate of UNOSOM II].

Having decided, at the consultations held on 20 Oct. 1994, to send a mission to Somalia (S/1994/1194), and convinced that it should consider the report of this mission before completing its review of the mandate of ONUSOM II and deciding on its future, decides to extend the mandate of ONUSOM II for an interim period expiring on 4 Nov. 1994; decides to remain actively seized of the matter (adopted unanimously, 3446th meeting, 31 Oct. 1994).

Decides to extend the mandate of ONUSOM II for a final period until 31 Mar. 1995; urges all Somali factions to negotiate an effective cease-fire and the formation of a transitional government of national unity; decides that every effort should be made to withdraw all ONUSOM II military forces and assets from Somalia in a secure and orderly manner as soon as possible, before the expiry date of the current mandate of ONUSOM II; authorizes ONUSOM II military forces to take those actions necessary to protect the ONUSOM II mission and the withdrawal of ONUSOM II personnel and assets; requests Member States to provide assistance in the withdrawal of all ONUSOM II military forces and assets, including vehicles, weapons, and other equipment; calls upon all Member States to continue to provide support for all Somali efforts towards genuine peace and national reconciliation; reiterates the need for the observance and strict monitoring of the general and complete embargo on all deliveries of weapons and military equipment to Somalia and requests the Committee established by resolution 751 (1992) to fulfil its mandate and in particular to seek the cooperation of neighbouring States; further requests the Secretary-General to continue to monitor the situation in Somalia (adopted unanimously, 3447th meeting 4 Nov. 1994).

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UN ANGOLA VERIFICATION MISSION (cont.)

Decides to extend the mandate of the UNAVEM II until 30 June 1994; reaffirms its readiness to consider promptly any recommendations from the Secretary-General for an expanded UN presence in Angola in the event a comprehensive peace settlement is reached; declares its intention to reconsider the role of UN in Angola in the event a peace agreement has not been reached in Lusaka by the time of the expiration of the extended mandate of UNAVEM II; decides, in view of the direct negotiations continuing between the parties, not to impose at present the additional measures against UNITA contained in paragraph 26 of resolution 864 (1993), but reiterates its readiness to consider at any time further steps in the light, inter alia, of a recommendation by the Secretary-General, either to impose such additional measures or to review those in effect; strongly deplores the resurgence of military actions throughout Angola contrary to resolution 903 (1994) and reiterates its demand that both parties cease immediately all offensive military operations; further deplores in this regard the worsening of the humanitarian situation and condemns acts that imperil humanitarian relief efforts, and all actions which would inhibit the free and unrestricted movement of humanitarian relief and humanitarian relief workers; requests the Secretary-General to submit to it, as soon as there is progress, and in any case by 30 June 1994, a report on the Lusaka Peace Talks and on the continued political will of the parties to achieve a lasting peace, with recommendations for the future UN presence in Angola (adopted unanimously, 3384th meeting, 31 May 1994).

S/RES/932 (1994) [Extension of the mandate of UNAVEM II].

Decides to extend the mandate of UNAVEM II until 30 Sept. 1994; declares its readiness to impose additional measures against UNITA as indicated in resolution 864 (1993) if by 31 July 1994 UNITA has not formally accepted the proposals on national reconciliation put forward by the Special Representative of the Secretary-General and the 3 observer States; urges the 2 neighbouring States which have so far failed to respond substantively to requests from the Committee established by resolution 864 (1993) for information required regarding alleged sanctions violations to do so promptly, and requests the Committee to provide a report to the Council, by 15 July 1994, on compliance with the sanctions regime; strongly deplores the intensification of offensive military actions throughout Angola contrary to resolution 922 (1994) and reiterates its demand that both parties cease immediately all military operations; further deplores the worsening of the humanitarian situation and strongly condemns acts that imperil humanitarian relief efforts; strongly urges both parties to grant immediately security clearances and guarantees for relief deliveries to all locations, and to refrain from any action which could jeopardize the safety of relief personnel or disrupt the distribution of humanitarian assistance to the Angolan people (adopted unanimously, 3395th meeting, 30 June 1994).

Decides to extend the mandate of UNAVEM II until 8 Dec. 1994; calls upon the parties to honour the commitments already made by them at the talks in Lusaka and urges them to conclude immediately an agreement and thereafter to establish and respect fully an effective and sustainable cease-fire as a matter of urgency; authorizes the restoration of the strength of UNAVEM II to its previous level of 350 military observers and 126 police observers with an appropriate number of international and local staff, the deployment of such additional personnel to take place upon receipt of a report from the Secretary-General to the Council that the parties have initialled a peace agreement and that an effective cease-fire is in place; déplore the continuation of military hostilities throughout Angola contrary to resolutions 922 (1994), 932 (1994), and 945 (1994) and reiterates its demand that both parties cease immediately all military operations; further déplore the deterioration in the humanitarian situation; reiterates in this context its demand for the immediate release by the responsible parties of the humanitarian relief workers who disappeared on 27 Aug. 1994 and its call for the complete cooperation of the parties, especially UNITA, with the UN investigation into their disappearance (adopted unanimously, 3445th meeting, 27 Oct. 1994).

Decides, in order to enable UNAVEM II to monitor the cease-fire established by the Lusaka Protocol, to extend its mandate until 8 Feb. 1995; underlines that the Security Council will monitor closely compliance with the cease-fire and requests the Secretary-General to keep the Council fully informed of any relevant developments; welcomes the Secretary-General's decision in accordance with resolution 952 (1994), to proceed with the restoration of the strength of UNAVEM II to its previous level, the actual enlargement being dependent on the strict observance by the parties of an effective cease-fire and on the provision by them of satisfactory guarantees regarding the safety and security of UN personnel; encourages the Secretary-General to continue to deploy personnel to the countryside, subject to the strict compliance by the parties with the conditions in paragraph 6 above; welcomes the resumption and the increased flow of humanitarian relief assistance throughout Angola and demands that both parties grant security clearances and guarantees for relief deliveries to all locations and refrain from any action which could jeopardize the safety of relief personnel or disrupt the distribution of humanitarian assistance to the Angolan people; requests the Secretary-General to inform the Security Council of the next steps to be taken by UN to implement a well-coordinated and comprehensive mine-clearance programme in Angola (adopted unanimously, 3477th meeting, 8 Dec. 1994).

S/RES/929 (1994) [Establishment of a temporary multinational humanitarian operation in Rwanda].

Agrees that a multinational operation may be set up for humanitarian purposes in Rwanda until UNAMIR is brought up to the necessary strength; welcomes the offer by Member States to cooperate with the Secretary-General through establishment of a temporary operation under national command and control aimed at contributing, to the security and protection of displaced persons, refugees and civilians at risk on the understanding that the costs of implementation will be borne by the Member States concerned; decides that the mission will be limited to a period of 2 months; requests the Secretary-General to identify essential equipment required by the expanded UNAMIR and calls on Member States to offer such support; demands that all parties to the conflict immediately bring to an end all killings of civilians in areas under their control and allow Member States cooperating with the Secretary-General to implement fully their mission; requests the States concerned and the Secretary-General to report to the Council no later than 15 days after adoption of this resolution, on its implementation and requests the Secretary-General to report on the progress of deployment of the expanded UNAMIR and on progress towards a political settlement under the Arusha Peace Agreement (adopted 10-0-5, 3392nd meeting, 22 June 1994).

Reiterates its call for an immediate cease-fire; stresses the importance of the existence and effective implementation of a cease-fire covering all ground, naval and air operations, including provisions on the positioning of heavy weapons out of range of Aden; strongly deplores the infliction of civilian casualties and destruction resulting from the continuing military assault on Aden; requests the Secretary-General and his Special Envoy to continue talks under their auspices with all concerned, with a view to implementing a durable cease-fire and to the possible establishment of a mechanism acceptable to both sides, preferably involving countries of the region, to monitor, encourage respect for, help to prevent violations of the cease-fire and to report to the Secretary-General; reiterates its call for an immediate cessation of the supply of arms and other materiel; urges all concerned to resume immediately their political dialogue thus permitting a peaceful resolution of their differences and the restoration of peace and stability, and requests the Secretary-General and his Special Envoy to examine appropriate ways of facilitating these aims; requests the Secretary-General to use the resources at his disposal, including those of the relevant UN agencies, to address urgently the needs of those affected by the conflict, in particular the inhabitants of Aden and those displaced by the conflict, and urges all concerned to provide humanitarian access and facilitate the distribution of relief supplies to those in need wherever they may be located; requests the Secretary-General to provide a progress report to the Council on the implementation of the present resolution as soon as possible and in any event within 15 days of the adoption of this resolution (adopted unanimously, 3394th meeting, 29 June 1994).
