Converging crises, shared solutions: Applying lessons from Asia and the Pacific to global challenges

Introduction

As the world navigates an era marked by intensifying socioeconomic pressures, geopolitical tensions, and accelerating climate shocks, the need for a shared and actionable global vision has never been more urgent. Achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) under such conditions requires not only renewed commitment but also deeper alignment between global and regional responses.

While shocks—economic, environmental, or political—often emerge locally or regionally, their ripple effects transcend borders due to the interconnectedness of our global systems. Whether it is a supply chain breakdown, a climate-induced disaster, or a regional conflict, the consequences now demand a coordinated global response informed by grounded, context-specific knowledge.

In May 2025, the UN High-level Advisory Board on Economic and Social Affairs (HLAB)—comprising thought leaders and practitioners from across regions and disciplines—will convene in Bangkok, Thailand, to explore emerging global socioeconomic trends, risks, and opportunities. This convergence of globally engaged experts in a dynamic regional setting presents a unique opportunity to foster a two-way exchange: how Asia-Pacific's experiences and innovations can inform global strategies, and how the broader international agenda can be grounded in regional context.

To bring this high-level conversation to a wider, global public, the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA) will host a Global Policy Dialogue on "Converging crises, shared solutions: Applying socioeconomic lessons from Asia-Pacific to global challenges" on the margins of the HLAB meeting. Through a moderated, interactive format—including online polls and live Q&A—the public will hear from HLAB members on the socioeconomic opportunities and policy innovations from Asia-Pacific



that can contribute to addressing shared global challenges. By breaking down boundaries between local realities and global ambitions, this event aims to help shape smart strategies to navigate an era of converging crises and transition toward a more resilient, just, and inclusive future.

This dialogue is being held in partnership with the UN Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP) and is made possible by the UN Peace and Development Trust Fund. It is free to join, and all are welcome.

Format

The 105-minute event will include two panel discussions. The discussions will be interactive and led by a professional moderator. Time will be reserved during the event for audience questions and polls. The audience will also be invited to submit questions in advance when completing the Zoom registration.

Location

The event will be recorded in person at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok with an in-person and virtual global audience.

Platform

The event will be organized with the support of ESCAP and will involve the hiring of a professional video production team. The audience can watch the event in person and through Zoom, UN WebTV, or on <u>UN DESA's Facebook page</u>. The audience also can access the Slido platform to participate in the polls, submit their own questions or vote up questions posed by others.

Language

The event will be held in English with multilingual captioning available in the six UN languages (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish) on Zoom.

 - What lessons can be drawn from Asia-Pacific's growing role in international diplomacy, trade, and geopolitics, and how can we use these lessons to strengthen the influence of developing countries in global decision-making on key socioeconomic issues? (Mr. Kimani)
 - Asia-Pacific is home to diverse economies with rapid growth, but also significant inequalities. How can the region leverage its economic dynamism to promote more equitable social development? (Ms. Dashti)
 - In many parts of Asia-Pacific, there is significant demographic and cultural diversity.
 What can we learn from these unique perspectives and realities that could inform development strategies to ensure sustainable and inclusive progress globally? (Mr.



Eloundou-Enyegue)

- The region faces public health challenges such as non-communicable diseases, aging populations, and health disparities. What are some innovative approaches that could be learned from this region to improve health outcomes and address health inequities, including for women and girls, while also preparing for future global health challenges? (Ms. Gage)
- In many parts of Asia-Pacific, there are deep structural issues around access to resources, education, and financial services. What policies or strategies learned from other regions can be implemented to ensure that vulnerable populations are able to seize economic opportunities and prepare for future global challenges? (Ms. Udovički)
- What role do partnerships and regional cooperation play in preparing the Asia and the Pacific for emerging global challenges such as migration, climate impacts, or technological disruptions, and how can these partnerships be strengthened for more effective global solutions? (Anyone)
- Given that local shocks now carry global consequences, what strategies can Asia and the Pacific adopt to build resilience at the national and regional levels while contributing to collective international solutions? (Anyone)
