Most of these opportunities are only available once students are in the final year of their university studies. Do you dream of working at the UN? A UN internship could be the ideal start for you!

UN interns gain first-hand experience in the day-to-day working environment. Most UN Departments participate in the UN internship program, providing a unique opportunity to interact with UN staff and to contribute to the UN's work, while also participating in meetings and conferences, and having many other interesting experiences. To be eligible to apply, you must be starting your final year of your undergraduate university degree, or have just graduated, or be in graduate school.
