Over 3,000 Southeast Asian youths actively participate in several international policy-making events, conferences, or engagements, providing them with opportunities to voice their concerns to government and institutional leaders. 3.) Fund at least one youth from each ASEAN member state to participate at international and regional conferences, and to host 1 regional conference by 2027.

Action (s) & Outcome (s)	1.) Provide capacity building activities for 10,000 ASEAN Youths to enhance skill development and encouraging the engagement of underrepresented groups in Southeast Asia. This includes women, individuals with low socio-economic status, and those pursuing non-STEM careers, all of whom are significant contributors to the clean energy transition movement. 2.) Have at least 50 sustainable youth-led projects as a direct result of our programs which help youths to apply their unique and inventive solutions and technologies in the fields of clean energy and green employment. This encompasses activities such as research initiatives, energy hackathons, and entrepreneurial endeavors, among others. 3.) Arranged 2,000 mentorship pairings to concentrate on creating opportunities to empower, mentor, and network with young energy enthusiasts in Southeast Asia. The aim is to connect them with leaders in both industry and government, preparing them for future employment opportunities in the clean energy sector.
