Syria: UNRWA - Humanitarian Snapshot, February 2017

UNRWA noted the escalation of violence in Dera'a Governorate, south of Damascus. Fighting among all parties to the conflict in the area at the end of February caused large displacement of families, impeded civilian access to live-saving aid and resulted in the deaths of Palestine refugees. UNRWA is closely monitoring the situation and started providing humanitarian assistance to the displaced in February.

EDUCATION:

UNRWA continued to provide prima students in 44 UNRWA schools and schools in government buildings. The conducted mine awareness education schools in Khan Eshieh, Husseiniyeh, a cooperation with UNICEF.

LIVELIHOODS:

In February, 2,780 Palestine refugees benefite through four microfinance offices across Syria. help Palestine refugees improve their standard o them to repair and refurnish homes and generate in establishing or developing businesses.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE:

UNRWA distributed a total of 12,544 hygiene kits, 840 baby and 4,250 sanitary napkins, as well as 700 baby kits to residents of coll through distributions centres. Provision of regular garbage collection, infrastructure rehabilitation, equipment, spare parts, fuel, and safe drinkir and host communities continued throughout the month.
