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# monthly updates on gender issues in unrwa and the region

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update of the month

In various fields of operations UNRWA is assessing the socio-economic impact of COVID-19 and the gender section is working with the various teams on ensuring that gender is taken into account in these assessments. These assessments seek to examine the increase in aggressive behavior in the home affecting women and children, pauperization of vulnerable groups like women heading households, neglect of women and girls with disabilities, and female among the elderly.

The She Can initiative for stronger women and girls in Lebanon: Self-defense courses

With 220 women currently enrolled, the initiative launched by CARE International and UN Women "She Can" provides free self-defense classes as well as psychological support and referrals for women and girls to strengthen women's protection and empowerment in Lebanon. In Beirut's southern suburbs, the number of victims of sexual violence is alarming. With the objective to end violence against refugee and host-community women, the course has helped many of them to feel more confident and stronger: "these sessions have also changed the relationship I have with my husband. I learned how to voice my opinions, claim my rights and express my views. Before, I did not dare to oppose him", says Maha. Fatima, a mother of four, adds that if she had not taken these classes, she would have never been able to defend herself in a society in which a woman can never disclose such an incident. Finally, Faten Tibi, who is responsible for women's economic empowerment at UN Women, observes that "selfdefense not only provides women with practical skills for self-protection, it increases women's sense of safety to deal with difficult situations". Gender and Organizational Change: The International Training Center ILO is organizing an online course on gender at the organizational level from 28 September to 4 December 2020. As greater representation of women in leadership roles and within organizations does not automatically translate with more equality, a change in organizational strategy is needed. The training aims at teaching different ways to include gender into management action plans in order to achieve long-term results and effective change. ## regional news

#### Lebanon

Over half of the people displaced by the blast, approximately 150,000 people, were women and girls. With the restrictions due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the situation will increase the gender-based violence threat. During an emergency like this, the mechanisms women and girls could reach out to seek protection are often malfunctioning due to the crisis, so it is essential to make sure to address the physical and psychological needs of these women and girls who are often those most affected by these crises. #### Egypt

A general decrease in underreported sexual assault cases has recently pushed the Egyptian government to submit a law that protects the identities of the women that sue for sexual harassment and assault. In line with the #MeToo movement that has recently started in Egypt over social media to speak up for women's rights, the newly approved bill automatically gives women that report sexual violence cases the right to anonymity. Violence: Availability and Accessibility in the Arab Region

The United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) Arab States Regional Office (ASRO) together with the Lebanese ABAAD Resource Centre for Gender Equality and Women Against Violence Europe (WAVE) have recently launched a snapshot that provides an overview on the availability and accessibility of shelters for survivors of gender-based violence in the Arab region, including the situation in UNRWA fields of operations. The study shows that despite the various initiatives that have been advanced by local authorities through the years, including legislation, policies and provision of shelters, there still exist many gaps in terms of capacity and financing of shelters for survivors of violence in the region. Shelters for Women Survivors of Estimating the Cost of Child Marriage in the Arab Region: Background Paper on the Feasibility of **Undertaking a Costing Study** 

> In partnership with the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) Center for Women and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) have developed a study which examines the cost of child marriage in the Arab States, in addition of identifying the causes and consequences of child marriage in the region. Among these, besides increasing gender-based violence and exploitation, child marriage can lead to serious sexual and reproductive health consequences as well as girls' socioeconomic exclusion. Moreover, the microdata available tracks child marriage also in UNRWA fields of operations, including Jordan, the State of Palestine and Syria. More here.
