A. Communications from Individuals Requesting Hearings

1. Letter dated 13 May 1947 from Mr. M. Goldfarb, 803 53rd Street, Brooklyn, New York, requesting an opportunity to address the Special Committee on the Palestine situation.
2. Letter dated 22 May 1947 from Mr. Jacob Heller, 19 Carmen Street, Dorchester, Massachusetts, requesting an opportunity to address the Special Committee in the matter of Palestine.
3. Letter dated 28 May 1947 from Mr. Charles Kornev, 2510 E. 5, Dayton, Ohio, requesting an opportunity to testify before the Committee for the purpose of elaborating on certain biblical texts.

1. Letter dated 22 April 1947 from The Jewish Publishing House, Ltd., Jerusalem, enclosing eight copies of a book "The Palestine Problem and its Solution", by Dr. S. Kaznelson, for distribution among members of the Special Committee.

C. Other Communications

1. Letter dated 15 May 1947 from Mr. Wesley F. Rennie, Associate General Secretary of the World's Alliance of Young Men's Christian Associations, 347 Madison Avenue, New York, offering the Special Committee the co-operation of his organization. Mr. Rennie specifies that Mr. A.L. Miller, General Secretary in Jerusalem of the Young Men's Christian Association, will be glad to afford the Committee every possible assistance.
2. Telegram dated 26 May 1947 from Mr. Ethin Bortnick, 2911 Barnes Avenue, Bronx, New York, requesting that the text of the telegram be read to the Special Committee.
3. Cablegram dated 29 May 1947 from the Central Committee of Liberated Jews in the United States Zone of Germany, inviting the Special Committee to visit the displaced persons camps in Europe in order that the Jewish displaced persons may be enabled to present their views and aspirations directly to the Committee. The Central Committee states that it represents over 160,000 Jewish displaced persons, the overwhelming majority of whom hope to resettle in Palestine.
4. 20,728 communications received up to 5 June 1947 from inmates of numerous displaced persons camps in the United States Zone in Germany. The writers of these letters petition the United Nations to facilitate their immigration into Palestine.
5. Twenty-one letters urging the development of the Jewish National Home in Palestine, unrestricted Jewish immigration into Palestine, the termination of the Mandate and the withdrawal of British troops. Note: One of the above letters also urges the Special Committee to take into consideration the rights of the Jewish and Arab population of Palestine.
