CONTUNICATION ERC! THE GOVERNMENT OF DALESTINE, ROLATING TO CORRECTIONS TO BE MADE IN THE "SUPPLEMENTARY MENO-RANDUM BY THE GOVERNMENT OF PALESTINE"

The following letter was received from the Government of Palestine, relating to corrections to be made in the "Supplementary Memorandum by the Government of Palestine" (1).

GENEVA, 30th August 1047.

Sir,

I am directed to request that the following corrections may be made to the document entitled "Supplementary Memorandum by the Government of Palestine, including Notes on Evidence given to the United Nations' Special Committee on Palestine up to the 12th July, 1947" which was presented to your Committee on 18th July:-

Page 33. The first sentence of the paragraph beginning "The Provisions of the Mandate" should read as follows:-

"The Mandate constituted an international instrument involving obligations in the international field, but, like the provisions of any treaty or convention, it would not in itself be a law capable of enforcement by the Courts."

The following should be substituted for the fifth sentence of this paragraph:-

"If these arrangements did not fulfil the obligations involved in the selection of His Majesty as Mandatory by the Principal Allied Powers and the terms of the Mandate, representations would no doubt have been made by the interested Powers through either the diplomatic channel or the League of Nations."

Page 46. For the paragraph beginning "Such an area" the following should be substituted:-

""Such an area, i.e. 650,000 dunums, might be considered to be about the approximate limit of the area which could at present be regarded as having a potentially economic, or nearly economic, supply of water, that is without resorting to speculative assumptions regarding the proportion that can actually be utilised of the water available at the source."
