WOMEN IN FIELDS (17")	The contribution of women to Africa's economic
	development has, in the past, been
	underestimated or neglected. But in traditional or
	tribal societies, women are expected to be
	significant wage earners. At the same time, they
	have to care for their families.
WOMEN/CROWDS (17")	In Nigeria and elsewhere on the continent,
	growing industrialization and urbanization has
	changed the lives of millions of women. It has
	become increasingly difficult to find jobs in the
	cities and unemployment among women is
	widespread.
PAN FROM FOREST TO	In oil production cities like Port Harcourt, in

	are very few. Apart from scarce clerical jobs,
	there is almost no work available to women in the
	oil industry. And yet, large numbers of people

WOMEN'S SKILLS CENTRE (10")

To address this issue, the Port Harcourt Women's Education Centre provides opportunities for women to gain employment and to set up their own businesses.

TRAINING (25")Supported by the UN Development Programme,
UNDP, the centre has trained hundreds of
women in sewing, fashion design and business
administration. After training, they can apply for
small grants and set up their own enterprises.
Acquiring these skills will give women an
advantage in the highly competitive job market.

ORIBI WAKAMA ON CAMERA (19") "It is difficult to compete with men. But these areas, like in sewing, women thrive very well so that they feel if they come into this place and get the training, they will be able to get employed under more experienced and established seamstresses."

NARRATION

Also available are cooking courses. Professional cooks teach the women the secrets of flavourful Nigerian cuisine. They learn how to combine all the different ingredients that make up Nigerian cooking, such as bitterleaf, chilli peppers, plantains, beans, cassava, corn, okra, oils and fish. Many women will apply for microcredit loans in order to open small restaurants at markets and roadside stalls. Empowering women is fundamentally important if Nigeria is to improve its low level of socio-economic development.
