NARRATION

MIRIAM BANDA WITH CROWD AT MARKET	Miriam Banda's day kept getting worse. (2.5)
	The AIDS educator was trying to speak to people gathered at a market in her home country of Zambia. (6.5)
	(NATURAL SOUND – CROWD OF MEN)
PEOPLE	But her words – "abstinence", "condoms", "get tested" – were falling on deaf ears. (7)
ZAMBIAN MAN ON-CAMERA	<u>MAN</u> : "The protection a condom gives, does not work" (2.5)
	MIRIAM:
MIRIAM ON-CAMERA	"My people still have excuses. Even when you see all the symptoms and somebody dies, they
ZAMBIAN PEOPLE/ AIDS	will tell you they were bewitched. There are

MIRIAM ON-CAMERA

But Miriam <u>knows better</u> – five years ago <u>she</u> was diagnosed HIV positive. Today she is one of fortymillion people infected worldwide – more than half live in Sub-Saharan Africa. (13.5)

MIRIAM:

"It's very, very serious. It's so serious that in my heart I wish my government would declare it a national disaster." (8)

NARRATION

What her government <u>did do</u> was, in 2002 for the first time ever, commit money and resources to a national strategy to fight AIDS. (9.5)

The best way to fight -- go <u>directly</u> to the people with prevention and support programs. And <u>that's</u> <u>exactly</u> what Miriam is doing... (8)

MIRIAM AT MARKET/SCHOOL

Together with the United Nations Development Programme, she and hundreds of other workers target the most vulnerable – the poor – at local markets and farms throughout Zambia...handing out brochures...answering questions...providing facts. (17)

(NATURAL SOUND)

MIRIAM MEETS GROUP OF HIV Also visited – hundreds of schools where POSITIVE WOMEN teachers are encouraged to talk openly with their students about sex. (7) (NATURAL SOUND) <u>NARRATION</u>

MIRIAM TALKING TO WOMEN

As for those <u>already</u> infected with the disease, instead of silence and denial... they're met with counselling and a safe place to talk about strategies for living with AIDS. (11.5)

(NATURAL SOUND)

While workers know that changing myths, misperceptions, and behaviours is an enormous challenge, they say the work must begin somewhere. (9.5)

<u>MIRIAM:</u>

MIRIAM ON-CAMERA

"Sometimes I feel helpless. But then again I know it's a day at a time, a little bit by a little bit. A long journey starts with a mile." (9)

<u>NARRATION</u> A journey that a devastated nation hopes will spare tens of thousands from a deadly enemy. (6.5)
