



RECOMMENDATIONS









ECONOMIC POLICIES, GROWTH AND EQUALITY

- Ensure that economic policies fully prioritize decent work and employment generation
- Facilitate an institutional and policy environment that promotes decent work for rural women
- Increase investments in infrastructure
- Policies and programmes that support rural women's, farmers' and producers' org.
- Promote rural and indigenous women's knowledge



ECONOMIC POLICIES, GROWTH AND EQUALITY CONT'D



- Develop and implement policies, programmes and incentives to enable rural women's active and effective engagement in the global value chain
- Tax systems
- Develop and adopt measures that offset the negative impact of global and regional trade agreements



EQUAL ACCESS TO AND CONTROL OF LAND AND OTHER RURAL PRODUCTIVE RESOURCES



- Ensure that national laws and policies guarantee women's right to land, and laws and policies on land are implemented
- Support the development and implementation of gender-sensitive land and property laws
- Promote changes in customary law
- Ensure that the option of joint titles is provided during land reform and records updates



EQUAL ACCESS TO AND CONTROL OF LAND AND OTHER RURAL PRODUCTIVE RESOURCES CONT'D



- Take measures to require the consent of each spouse for the sale of land, or its use as collateral
- Registration of land for collective use: include the names of all ♀ and ♂ members users
- Institute and enforce policies that limit the quantity of national land that foreign countries and corporations can buy. Hold Governments accountable for "land grabbing"
- Protect the rights of rural women affected by land expropriation



EQUAL ACCESS TO AND CONTROL OF LAND AND OTHER RURAL PRODUCTIVE RESOURCES CONT'D



- Ensure that changes in land administration or changes in land tenure systems do not cause environmental damage, negative impact on household food and nutrition security
- Prepare resettlement plans
- Enable small-holder farmers and agricultural workers, in particular women, to become more productive, competitive and profitable through strengthening provision of, and linkages to, affordable and labour-saving technologies, inputs, services and access to capacity development, and enhance their market access by identifying and addressing gender specific constraints
- Recognize and support women as actors in climate change adaptation and mitigation



PROVISION OF AND ENTITLEMENT TO SERVICES



- Necessary space and infrastructure rural women's access to information, education and training
- Mechanisms that empower rural producers' and women's organizations
- Promote South-South exchange and use of knowledge, technologies,
- Ensure that access to essential services for poor rural communities is free from cost recovery and user fees
- Increase rural women's access to financial services
- Support community-managed financial services
- Invest in off-farm care services for children, elderly and persons with disabilities
- Recognize and invest in community health insurance



LEADERSHIP, DECISIONMAKING AND VOICE



- Awareness about rights, policies and the gov. roles and duty
- Strengthen gender-responsive accountability mechanisms to influence policy formulation, implementation, and monitoring at all levels
- Quotas, to promote rural women's participation in DM processes
- Enhance the economic empowerment of rural women
- Gender units established and/or strengthened at senior levels
- Free-of-charge access to personal identification documents
- **Develop the capacity of rural \mathcal{P}'s, \mathcal{O}'s** to be more inclusive
- Assist informal rural women's groups
- Promote knowledge sharing
- Support regional level dialogues among rural women farmers' organizations



MONITORING AND EVALUATION



- Data collected **disaggregated** by sex, age, and other variables
- Promote time-use surveys and facilitate their use
- Measurement of ec. Growth / include the contribution of rural women and men (paid and unpaid)
- Data and information widely disseminated and accessible
- Develop the capacities of rural women and their organizations
- Provide training in participatory methods to scientists and policy-makers at different levels and in different disciplines.



RESOURCES



- Allocate adequate financial resources in national budgets for the economic empowerment of rural women
- Ensure financial support for rural women's organizations, including for awareness-raising on rural women's rights



UN SYSTEM



- Gender equality and diversity commitments
- Improve gender statistics and data disaggregated by sex, age and other variables
 - establish multi-disciplinary teams
 - promote south-south exchanges
 - strengthen dialogues between users and producers of data in different sectors

CONCLUDING REMARKS




- Hard work on ♀ remains with you
